HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES 149th GENERAL ASSEMBLY

HOUSE BILL NO. 422

AN ACT TO AMEND TITLE 31 OF THE DELAWARE CODE RELATING TO THE DELAWARE INTERAGENCY COUNCIL ON HOMELESSNESS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF DELAWARE:

1	Section 1. Amend Subchapter VI, Chapter 40, Title 31 of the Delaware Code by making deletions as shown by
2	strikethrough and insertions as shown by underline as follows:
3	Subchapter VI. Delaware Interagency Council on Homelessness [Reserved.]
4	Section 2. Amend § 4060, Title 31 of the Delaware Code by making deletions as shown by strike through and
5	insertions as shown by underline as follows:
6	§ 4060. Delaware Interagency Council on Homelessness. [Reserved.]
7	(a) The Delaware Interagency Council on Homelessness is hereby established.
8	(b) The duties of the Council shall include, but not be limited to, the following:
9	(1) Oversee the implementation of a plan to reduce homelessness and end chronic homelessness in Delaware;
10	(2) Review, on a continuing basis, all state policies, plans, programs and activities concerning individuals and
11	families who are homeless, assisted, in whole or part, by state departments, agencies or funds in order to determine
12	whether such policies, programs, plans and activities effectively meet the needs;
13	(3) Use the data on homelessness from the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) and other
14	nonduplicative, technology-based methods of collecting such information for analyses;
15	(4) Effectively coordinate and maximize resources of existing programs and activities to prevent
16	homelessness and to assist individuals and families who are homeless to obtain housing;
17	(5) Identify impediments, including any statutory and regulatory restrictions, to the effective provision of
18	needed services to individuals and families who are homeless in Delaware;
19	(6) Recommend such changes in existing programs and services, expansion of existing programs and services,
20	and additional programs and services as may be necessary to address the diverse causes and conditions of
21	homelessness;

22 (7) Provide the Governor, the General Assembly, and the general public with review and comment, as well as 23 analyses and recommendations on all state and federal legislative proposals and regulations and policies affecting 24 homeless people. Propose and promote such legislation, regulations and policies to improve the delivery of services to 25 homeless individuals; 26 (8) Prepare and submit to the Governor and the General Assembly an annual report of the activities of the 27 Council and the status of services and programs for individuals and families who are homeless; and 28 (9) On or before April 1, 2013, and annually on that same date thereafter, the Council, in conjunction with the 29 Department of Services for Children, Youth and Their Families shall prepare and submit a report to the Governor and 30 the General Assembly analyzing the status and effectiveness of existing programs for runaway and homeless youth, as 31 well as the need for additional programs and services. The report shall specifically address, but not be limited to, the 32 following issues: 33 a. Runaway and homeless youth identification and needs assessment. The report shall encompass data 34 indicating the number of Delaware runaway and unaccompanied homeless youth, as defined across the agencies 35 and state systems, and an assessment of programmatic needs for this at-risk population. 36 b. Street and community outreach and drop in programs; youth drop in centers. The report shall identify 37 community services that provide walk-in access to crisis intervention and ongoing supportive services, including 38 1-to-1 case management services on a self referral basis, and street outreach programs which locate, contact and 39 provide information, referrals and services to runaway and homeless youth. Information, referrals and services 40 provided may include, but are not limited to: family reunification services; conflict resolution or mediation 41 counseling; assistance in obtaining temporary emergency shelter; case management aimed at obtaining food, 42 clothing, medical care or mental health counseling; counseling regarding violence, prostitution, substance abuse, 43 sexually transmitted diseases, HIV and pregnancy; referrals to other agencies that provide support services to 44 runaway and homeless youth; assistance with education, employment and independent living skills; aftercare 45 services; and specialized services for highly vulnerable runaways and homeless youth, including teen parents, 46 sexually exploited youth, and youth with mental illness or developmental disabilities. 47 e. Emergency shelter programs. The report shall identify emergency shelter programs which provide 48 runaway and homeless youth with referrals and walk-in access to short-term residential care on an emergency 49 basis. The identified programs must provide runaway and homeless youth with safe, dignified, voluntary housing, 50 including private shower facilities, beds and at least 1 meal each day. Additional services should include, but 51 should not be limited to: family reunification services or referral to safe, dignified housing; individual, family and

- group counseling; assistance obtaining clothing; access to medical and dental care and mental health counseling;
 education and employment services; recreational activities; case management, advocacy and referral services;
 independent living skills training; and aftercare, follow-up services and transportation.
- 55 d. Transitional living programs. The report shall identify transitional living programs that help runaway 56 and homeless youth find and maintain safe, dignified housing. The identified programs should also provide rental 57 assistance and related supportive services or may refer youth to other organizations or agencies that provide such 58 services. Services provided may include, but should not be limited to: provision of safe, dignified housing; 59 educational assessment and referrals to educational programs; career planning, employment, job skills training, 60 and independent living skills training; job placement; budgeting and money management; assistance in securing 61 housing appropriate to needs and income; counseling regarding violence, prostitution, substance abuse, sexually 62 transmitted diseases and pregnancy; referral for medical services or chemical dependency treatment; parenting
- 63 skills; self-sufficiency support services or life skills training; and aftercare and follow-up services.
- 64 (c) For administrative purposes, this Council is placed within the Delaware State Housing Authority.
- 65 (d) The Council shall be composed of 25 members appointed by, and serving at the pleasure of the Governor.
- 66 Members of the Council shall be persons charged with the management of programs mandated and authorized by the
- 67 McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act [42 U.S.C. § 11301 et seq.] in Delaware and persons currently charged with the
- 68 management of other public funds targeted to services for the homeless in Delaware. The Council shall include
- 69 representatives from appropriate administering entities within the following departments or agencies:
- 70 (1) The Director of the Delaware State Housing Authority or a designee of the Director;
- 71 (2) The Secretary of the Department of Health and Social Services or a designee of the Secretary;
- 72 (3) The Secretary of the Department of Services for Children, Youth, and Their Families or a designee of the
- 73 Secretary;
- 74 (4) The Secretary of the Department of Labor or a designee of the Secretary;
- 75 (5) The Secretary of the Department of Education or a designee of the Secretary;
- 76 (6) The Commissioner of the Department of Correction or a designee of the Commissioner;
- 77 (7) The Chairs of the Senate Community/County Affairs Committee and the House of Representatives
- 78 Housing and Community Affairs Committee or a designee of the Chairs;
- 79 (8) The County Executive of New Castle County or the Executive's designee;
- 80 (9) The Kent County Administrator or the Administrator's designee;
- 81 (10) The Sussex County Administrator or the Administrator's designee;

82	(11) The Mayor of the City of Wilmington or the Mayor's designee;
83	(12) The Mayor of the City of Dover or the Mayor's designee;
84	(13) A person who is homeless or formerly homeless;
85	(14) One private citizen from each county;
86	(15) Three representatives from homeless service providers;
87	(16) A representative of the Homeless Planning Council;
88	(17) A representative of the Delaware Apartment Association; and
89	(18) A representative of the following councils and committees:
90	a. State Council for Persons with Disabilities;
91	b. Council on Public Health; and
92	e. Criminal Justice Council.
93	(e) Members of the Council shall serve without compensation except that they may be reimbursed for reasonable
94	and necessary expenses incident to their duties as members of the Council.
95	(f) A Chairperson of the Council shall be chosen by the members of the Council from among the Council members
96	and shall serve in that capacity for a term of 1 year and shall be eligible for reappointment.
97	(g) The Council shall determine its meeting schedule, but there shall be not less than 4 meetings each calendar
98	year, open to the public, held in an accessible place and with accommodations for people with disabilities.
99	(h) The Council shall have the authority to draft and adopt bylaws governing its operations, consistent with the
100	provisions herein.
101	(i) The Council may establish committees as may be necessary and practicable to carry out the aforementioned
102	duties.
103	(j) A simple majority of the total membership shall constitute a quorum which shall be necessary to vote on any

<u>SYNOPSIS</u>

This Act dissolves the Delaware Interagency Council on Homelessness (DICH). The DICH has been an important venue for significant progress in addressing homelessness in Delaware. However, changes to the primary source of federal assistance for resources for homelessness required the establishment of a Continuum of Care. The similar goals, tasks, and membership of the Continuum of Care have made the DICH obsolete and duplicative of these efforts.

Delaware's Continuum of Care was established in July 2015 and is charged with statewide coordination to address homelessness including the review system performance, identifying system gaps, and advancing solutions. It is a membership body with open membership to any who would like to participate and the membership elects the Continuum of Care Board. The Continuum of Care Board includes representation similar to that of the DICH: state agencies, local government, service providers, and advocates.

Until the establishment of the Continuum of Care Governance Charter in 2015, the DICH was also responsible for many systems tasks that now must be completed by the Continuum of Care. There is significant overlap in membership between the DICH and the Continuum of Care and combined with the Continuum of Care's responsibility for the tasks

previously handled by the DICH, it is difficult to get a quorum at DICH meetings and it is not feasible or sensible to have 2 separate, active entities working on the same issues.
