AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR CERTAIN GRANTS-IN-AID FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2023; SPECIFYING CERTAIN PROCEDURES, CONDITIONS AND LIMITATIONS FOR THE EXPENDITURE OF SUCH FUNDS; AMENDING THE FISCAL YEAR 2023 APPROPRIATIONS ACT; AMENDING THE FISCAL YEAR 2023 ONE-TIME SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATIONS ACT; AND AMENDING CERTAIN STATUTORY PROVISIONS.

15 the Office of the Controller General. Disbursements from this account shall be made in consultation with the University of  
16 Delaware and with the approval of the Co-Chairs of the Joint Finance Committee.

17 **Section 9.** (a) It is the intent of the General Assembly that each Grant-in-Aid recipient shall submit one of the following  
18 with its application for a grant award in each fiscal year:

3           **Section 10.** It is the intent of the Joint Finance Committee to review all Grant-in-Aid applications and give consideration  
4 to the diversity of an agency's revenues, including the percentage of revenues that are from other State funding sources, agency  
5 grants, or contracts. The Joint Finance Committee will also consider the percentage of an agency's budget allocated to salaries and  
6 benefits.

7           **Section 11.** Section 1 of this Act makes an appropriation to the County Seat Package, of that amount, \$100,000 is

11 appropriation. Through that process, the Department shall establish a per slot/child rate that will increase favorable outcomes for  
12 children facing barriers of race and poverty by providing full-day services to children, ensuring competitive staff salaries and  
13 benefits and proper certification requirements for educators supporting this program, and allowing for appropriate staff-child  
14 ratios. Staff salaries and staff-child ratios should be established consistent with the standards and assumptions used in the Redding  
15 Consortium’s recommendations. The RFP and per slot/child rate for programming funded by this Section shall specifically allow  
16 for applicants to apply for funds for professional development, technical assistance, expansion planning, curriculum, supplies, non-  
17 capital equipment, staff recruitment and retention incentives, family/parent engagement, family services staffing, student follow-  
18 up, and tracking of outcomes. The RFP for programming funded by this Section should, if feasible, allow applicants to apply for  
19 funds in the same application in which they apply for ECAP funds, and make explicit that application for programming funded by  
20 this Section does not affect an applicant’s eligibility for the ECAP program. However, funds appropriated pursuant to this Section  
21 shall not be used for any purposes not explicitly authorized by this Section.

22 Each provider will offer a comprehensive program, based on Head Start Program Performance Standards, and implement:

23 (a) Interpersonal interactions with well-trained and highly skilled teachers that tailor their interactions to fit the needs of  
24 the child—using responsive language, engaging all children in classroom activities, fostering independence, and creating  
25 a language rich environment, and use an appropriate curriculum to structure the learning experience.

26 (b) Physical environment, both indoors and outdoors, where children can play, explore, and learn safely and include  
27 engaging and developmentally appropriate materials and be arranged to promote independence and exploration based on  
28 children’s different stages of development.

29 (c) Program support structure that includes effective leaders who can provide instructional support to teachers as well as  
30 sound business management to the overall program to implement a high-functioning operating environment.

1 Any provider meeting Head Start Program Performance Standards and otherwise meeting the requirements of this Section  
2 should be permitted to apply for funds appropriated pursuant to this Section, regardless of that provider's participation in other  
3 state programs.

4 The Department must prioritize applicants who can meet higher standards including full-day programming at a minimum  
5 of six hours per day and at a minimum of 180 days per year and teachers who are early childhood certified. The Department of  
6 Education shall provide a written report to the Office of Management and Budget and the Controller General on January 1, 2023,  
7 with respect to implementation of the program funded by this Section.

8 **Section 36.** Section 1 of the Fiscal Year 2023 One-Time Supplemental Appropriations Act (Senate Bill 251 of the 151st  
9 General Assembly) appropriates \$12,604,100 for Mental Health Services Unit Contingency and \$3,933,000 for Marijuana Control  
10 Act Contingency to Office of Management and Budget, Contingencies and One-Time Items (10-02-11). The Director of the Office  
11 of Management and Budget and Department of Education may expend up to \$2,067,000 of the Mental Health Services Unit  
12 Contingency and \$2,933,000 of the Marijuana Control Act Contingency for mental health services in schools with Title I  
13 designation in grades 6 through 8, contingent upon passage of House Bill 300 or similar legislation of the 151st General Assembly.

14 Notwithstanding any other provision of Delaware Code to the contrary, these funds shall be allocated as a block grant for  
15 purposes of providing mental health services in school districts and charter schools. Said funds shall be distributed to local  
16 education agencies (LEAs) on a pro-rata basis based on student population enrolled in schools with Title I designation in grades 6  
17 through 8, as determined by the September 2021 unit count. To the extent that funding is available, LEAs may not reduce existing  
18 ratios. Further, the Office of Management and Budget shall utilize up to \$1,700,000 in unexpended Fiscal Year 2022 funding to  
19 support this block grant.

20 Additionally, no later than February 15, 2023, each LEA shall report to the Department of Education, Office of  
21 Management and Budget, Controller General's Office, and Co-Chairs of the Joint Finance Committee on its progress to hire  
22 mental health professionals. This report shall include the number of full-time staff and contracted positions filled, by title and  
23 funding source, for the following classifications: school counselor, school social worker, licensed clinical social worker, school  
24 psychologist, and licensed mental health therapist. This report shall include data for both the 2021-2022 school year and the 2022-  
25 2023 school year.

26 **Section 37.** Section 1 of the Fiscal Year 2023 Appropriations Act (Senate Bill 251 of the 151st General Assembly)  
27 appropriates \$123,717,700 for Salary/OEC Contingency in Executive, Office of Management and Budget, Contingencies and One-  
28 Time Items (10-02-11). The Office of Management and Budget has the authority to reallocate \$351,700 of this appropriation to the  
29 Department of Correction, Healthcare, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services, Medical Treatment and Services (38-02-01)

1 to establish and provide midwifery or doula services consistent with the provisions of House Bill No. 345 of the 151st General  
2 Assembly.

3 **Section 38.** Notwithstanding the provisions of any law, rule, or regulation to the contrary any applicant for a standard  
4 certificate pursuant to 14 Del. C. § 1220(a), when at the time of application for licensure, or hire, the requirement for passing an  
5 examination of content knowledge, including Praxis II, is suspended as a result of the Governor’s Declaration of State of  
6 Emergency. An applicant may have until December 31, 2022, to complete and pass the aforementioned examination.

7 **Section 39.** Notwithstanding the provisions of any law, rule, or regulation to the contrary remove language in 4 Del. C. §  
8 904(g) that references “a permit by the Commission” and 4 Del. C. § 302 in its entirety.
