


On the Horizon

Performance Measures, FY 24 Actual

% of cases/petitions disposed within 90 days of the date of submission

FY 2026 Recommended Items



Court of Chancery



Recommended: 2 Magistrates

Part 2 of the 2-year plan:

- 2.0 Magistrates in Chancery
- Support Staff including 2.0 Judicial Secretaries, 2.0 Judicial Case
 Managers, 2.0 Law Clerks, and 2.0 Court Reporters
- Recommended @ 9 months funding, \$885,000

Court of Chancery Magistrates

- Magistrates effective at reducing the caseloads for Vice Chancellors.
- Magistrates will take on expanded role.
- Several Vice Chancellors are former Court of Chancery Magistrates.

Court of Chancery Magistrates

Magistrates in Chancery Case Types:

- Traditional equitable matters (trusts and estates, HOA, property disputes, Register of Wills, pro se litigants, among others)
- As of March 2023, books and records actions
- Currently transferring benefit of creditor cases
- By end of calendar year, all advancement actions

Court of Chancery Magistrates

With 3 of the 5 Magistrates in Chancery being new hires within the last 4 months:

Total Current Caseload of the Chancellor and Vice-Chancellors (combined) = 1564*

Target Caseload = 1240

Total Current - but growing - Caseload of Magistrates (combined) = 449 *

➤ Target Caseload = 580

With current resources, Magistrates in Chancery can only handle about 40% of the cases that could be transferred from the Vice-Chancellors dockets.

Motions To Expedite

- Increased from 340 in 2017 to about 450 in 2024.
- Over one-third of all new actions are expedited.
- Displaces pending cases, meaning that other cases pile up until the expedited cases are completed.

Resources and Needs

History of Judicial Positions

- 2.0 Vice-Chancellors were added in FY 2019, total of 7 judges.
- 1.0 Magistrate was added in FY 2023.
- 2.0 new Magistrates were added in FY 2025, total of 5 of the planned 7 Magistrates.

Needs

- Since CY 2018, new cases have increased 49% and trials have gone up over 145%.
- "Mega cases" impose additional strain on the court docket.

Family Court



Recommended: Family Court Judge

Part 2 of the 2-year plan:

- 1.0 Judge for Kent County to coincide with new Courthouse (3 months).
- Support Staff including Judicial Secretary, Law Clerk, Court Security Officer and Judicial Case Manager.
- Kent County's population increased 43.5% from 2000 to 2020 with no new judges in Family Court for the 20 years.

Recommended: Family Court Switch-Fund

Switch-fund of \$1,704,600 and 18.0 GF FTEs for Family Court from ASF to GF.



- In FY 2017, there was a "temporary" switch-fund of 4 FTEs and operating costs from GF to Title IV-D ASF.
- Family Court's deficit has grown over the years due to a reduction in revenues and an increase in salaries.
- Anticipated \$2.2M deficit by the end of FY 2026 if nothing is done.

Recommended: JP Court Switch-Fund

Switch-fund of \$773,000 and 10.0 FTE Court Security Officers from ASF to GF.



- Currently 30.5 FTEs funded with the Court Security Fund (Branch-wide).
- Court Security balances depleted due to increased expenses and reduced revenues.
- A \$1.1 million deficit projected in FY 2026 if nothing is done.

Recommended: JP Court Lease

- \$200,000 for JP 20 lease costs.
- LLWJC fully occupied, many courts have severe space issues – especially the Court of Chancery.
- Most affordable solution JP Court 20 move to space in Wilmington - frees up about 10 thousand square feet for the Court of Chancery.

Recommended: Other Items

Personnel Contingencies, Annualizations and DTI SEUS costs.

- \$1.9M for legislative fiscal notes, including:
 - ✓ SS 1 for SB 1, Right to Representation LL/T
 - ✓ SS 1 for SB 2, Permit to Purchase
 - ✓ HB 86, Parental Representation

Recommended: Civil Indigent Services

- Recommended: \$400,000 additional for Civil Indigent Services (under OMB's continency and one-time budget).
- Civil legal investment saves the State money by helping people have access to housing, employment, public income benefits, health and medical benefits, and more.

Items



Request: Interpreter Funds

- Request: Additional \$487,000 for Interpreters.
- Constitutional requirement. The AOC is currently funded \$523,300 for interpreter services but will spend more than \$1 million in the current fiscal year.



The AOC has implemented numerous cost-saving measures over the years but must compete with neighboring states over few qualified professionals.

Request: Court of Chancery Support Staff

Request: \$526,100 & 7.0 FTEs to complete the existing Magistrate Teams

- 2 Judicial Secretaries, 2 Law Clerks, 2 Judicial Case Managers, and 1
 Court Reporter for scheduling, case management.
- The Court of Chancery has experienced significant growth in recent years, with an increase of 49% for new cases, 44% increase of all motions, a 48% increase in the motions to expedite, and an increase of 145% of trial days.

- 2.0 Complex Commercial Litigation Division (CCLD) Law Clerks for Superior Court, \$151,200 plus \$6,000 One-Time
- 1.0 Community Court Coordinator, CCP, \$87,900
- 1.0 Judge for Kent County, JP Court, \$95,100
- 1.0 Operations Manager for Kent County, JP Court, \$93,000
- 2.0 Court Security Officers, JP Court, \$35,400
- Convert 2 c/s to FTEs, OSCCE, \$107,000
- 2.0 Electronic Court Reporters, Family Court, \$92,900

Victim Offender Alternative Case Resolution

- Requesting more financial support for the program, which began in FY 2000, and has received no increase in funding since FY 2001.
- Funding cut in FY 2010 and never restored.
- To resolve cases in a mutually acceptable manner, the program works with:
 - ✓ Adults and juveniles
 - ✓ Victims and defendants
 - ✓ In CCP and Family Court
- Cases may resolve with apologies, community service, payment of restitution and/or completion of relevant courses such as anger management or shoplifting prevention.

Office of the Child Advocate

Maternal and Child Death Review Commission

Non-Judicial Agencies

Reasons for an organizational restructure:

- The NJAs are advocates and agency watchdogs, while the Judicial Branch is the fair and neutral arbiter of cases.
- The NJAs report to their own Executive Branch commissions or boards, with one appointed by the Governor.
- Much of the NJAs mission falls outside the work and expertise of the AOC.

Non-Judicial Agencies

- AOC submitted the "Section 49" report on February 1, 2024, with mutually beneficial recommendations for restructuring the NJAs.
- AOC worked collaboratively on the recommendations with the NJA directors.
- The NJAs strongly prefer to be independent.
- The Judicial Branch supports any steps that would reduce the NJAs reliance on the AOC and advance the goal of restructuring.
