

Joint Finance Committee Hearing: February 1, 2024







- HBCUs represent just 3% of all higher education institutions in the United States—there are 101 HBCUs, both public and private—but nearly 20% of all bachelor's degrees are awarded to Black graduates.
- HBCUs have graduated 40% of all Black engineers;
 40% of all Black US Congress members;
 50% of all Black lawyers; and 80% of all Black judges.
- HBCUs also supply more Black applicants to medical schools than non-HBCU institutions.
- Delaware State University is now the #1 choice for students of color in Delaware.







- Completed mandatory sensitivity training for the entire University community.
- Completed safety upgrades throughout the main campus and DSU Downtown.
- Implemented body cameras for all Public Safety campus security officers.
- Continued enhancement of our special support groups for survivors and/or student allies.
- Held our first Safe Space Conference, an impressive public start to a long-term cultural change.






Fall '23 Enrollment: A New Record


This fall, we welcomed another record-setting freshman class and a record 6,400 registered students.

Responsible Growth – 3% in Fall 2023




Largest Research Portfolio in University History

Research Yields Funding for DSU



Dr. Eleanor Kiesel, Associate Dean of the Wesley College of Health and Behavioral Sciences, and Kim Graham, Director of the WCHBS Trauma Academy, successfully wrote the grant proposal that resulted in a two-year, \$300,000 award in support of DSU's Safe Space Project.



A \$300,000 grant from the Healthy Housing Initiative of Catholic Charities USA will allow researchers to conduct an evaluation of chronic homelessness.



Dr. Wilbert Long III, a DSU Senior Research Scientist, was the recipient of a three-year, \$382,163 USDA grant in support of his research on food safety, stress, and sleep.



Dr. Aristides Marcano received significant support for his ongoing singlet oxygen research through an award of a four-year, \$750,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Defense (DoD).

"Launched in 2021 under the Commander, Naval Air Forces division (CNAF), the summer flight academy was created to help broaden representation in naval aviation. The Navy's sponsorship of the program — with an approximate value of \$28,000 per student — lets participants attend without imposing financial burdens, officials said."





Early College School

- Enrollment of 520
- 464 students have graduated from the ECS high school since the first class in 2018.
- ECS graduation rate is 95.39%.
- The six graduating classes have earned 13,190 college credits and been awarded \$38 million in scholarships.
- 67% have elected to continue at Delaware State University.



Social Work Program Expansion

REQUESTED: \$401.8

Delaware State University has the only accredited Social Work degree program in the State of Delaware.

- In 5 years, DSU's program has grown:
 - From 327 to 577 undergraduate students
 - From 8 to 65 graduate students
- Delivery for access: face-to-face, hybrid, and online
- Additional positions needed to maintain accreditation compliance through the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE)





Master of Science Clinical Psychology

REQUESTED: \$523.5

- Implement Master of Science in Clinical Psychology
- Path forward:
 - Course Development
 - Workforce Development
 - Hiring of Program Director, *Internship and Practicum Coordinator, and professors in each of the specialization pathways
- Provide specialization pathways in general psychology, neuropsychology, and school psychology
