HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES 152nd GENERAL ASSEMBLY

HOUSE BILL NO. 415

AN ACT TO AMEND TITLE 6 AND TITLE 31 OF THE DELAWARE CODE RELATING TO INDIVIDUALS WHO ARE EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS.

1	WHEREAS, the 2025 point in time check showed there were 1,255 nomeless individuals in Delaware, and
2	WHEREAS, this was a significant increase in homelessness in Delaware especially unsheltered; and
3	WHEREAS, almost 200 people in Delaware were unsheltered during the 2023 point in time check; and
4	WHEREAS, this was a 28% increase from the prior year; and
5	WHEREAS, in January 2022 35,574 Veterans experienced homelessness nationally; and
6	WHEREAS, Veterans are 50% more likely to experience homelessness than other Americans; and
7	WHEREAS, 79 veterans experiencing homelessness per the 2023 point in time count; and
8	WHEREAS, the Delaware 2023 stand down had 31 Veterans state they are at risk for homelessness; and
9	WHEREAS, it is the policy of the State to ensure that the peace, health, safety, and general welfare of all the
10	inhabitants of the State are protected.
11	NOW, THEREFORE:
12	BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF DELAWARE:
13	Section 1. Amend Title 6 of the Delaware Code by making deletions as shown by strike through and insertions as
14	shown by underline as follows:
15	Chapter 45A. Anti-Discrimination Provisions for Individuals Experiencing Homelessness.
16	§ 4501A. Short title.
17	This chapter may be cited as the "Anti-Discrimination Provisions for Individuals Experiencing Homelessness."
18	§ 4502A. Declaration of Policy.
19	The policy of this State is to assure that all individuals, regardless of housing status, have equal opportunity to live
20	in decent, safe, sanitary, and healthful accommodations anywhere within the State. It is also the policy of this State that all
21	individuals, regardless of housing status, enjoy equality of opportunities, more generally, in order to protect and ensure the
22	peace, health, safety, and general welfare of all inhabitants of the State

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23	§ 4503A. Definitions.
24	As used in this chapter:
25	(1) "Commission" means the State Human and Civil Rights Commission.
26	(2) "Complainant" means an individual who files a complaint alleging that a discriminatory act occurred.
27	(3) "Conciliation" means the attempted resolution of issues raised by a complaint, or by the investigation of a
28	complaint, through informal negotiations involving the aggrieved person, the respondent, and the Division.
29	(4) "Discriminatory act" means a violation of § 4504A(a) of this title.
30	(5) "Division" means the Division of Human and Civil Rights.
31	(6) "Emergency shelter" means a facility that provides shelter for individuals experiencing homelessness.
32	(7) "Housing status" means the type and location of housing in which an individual resides or has resided, and
33	the status of having or not having a fixed or regular residence. All of the following are examples of "housing status":
34	a. The status of living or having lived on the street, in a temporary shelter, or other temporary residence.
35	b. The status of living or having lived in an institution.
36	c. The status of living or having lived in public housing, at a particular address, or in a particular
37	neighborhood.
38	d. The status of being an individual experiencing homelessness.
39	(8) "Individual experiencing homelessness" means any of the following:
40	a. An individual who is living in a place not meant for human habitation.
41	b. An individual who is living in a temporary shelter.
42	c. An individual who is exiting an institution and who met the definition of individual experiencing
43	homelessness under another paragraph of this section immediately before entering the institution.
44	d. An individual who will lose the individual's housing within 14 days.
45	e. An individual that does not have housing and is unlikely to obtain housing, including an
46	unaccompanied youth or guardian with a child, who satisfies either of the following:
47	1. Has not had a lease or ownership interest in a housing unit in at least the previous 60 days and is
48	unlikely to obtain housing.
49	2. Changed housing at least twice in the last 60 days, and who is unlikely to obtain housing.
50	f. An individual who is fleeing or attempting to flee domestic abuse, has no other housing, and lacks the
51	resources or support networks to obtain housing.
52	g. An individual regarded as being an individual experiencing homelessness.

53	(9) "Institution" means a facility in which an individual is committed due to involvement with the criminal
54	justice system or is committed or enters for treatment, and includes a prison, behavioral health facility, hospital, half-
55	way house.
56	(10) "Reasonable search" means a search that is permitted by the Constitutions of the United States and the
57	State.
58	(11) "Respondent" means the person named in a complaint filed with the Division of Human and Civil Rights
59	and that is alleged to have committed a discriminatory act.
60	(12) "Temporary shelter" means an emergency shelter or transitional housing provided to individuals
61	experiencing homelessness.
62	(13) "Transitional housing" means any facility whose primary purpose is to facilitate the movement of
63	individuals experiencing homelessness to permanent housing within approximately 24 months.
64	(14) "Unaccompanied youth" means a homeless child that is not in the physical home of or being cared for by
65	a parent or guardian.
66	§ 4504A. Anti-Discrimination Provisions.
67	(a) An individual's rights, privileges, and access to public services may not be denied or abridged solely because
68	the individual is an individual experiencing homelessness. An individual experiencing homelessness is granted the same
69	rights and privileges as any other resident of this State. An individual experiencing homelessness has all of the following
70	rights:
71	(1) To use and move freely in public spaces, including public sidewalks, public parks, public transportation,
72	and public buildings, in the same manner as any other individual and without discrimination on the basis of the
73	individual's housing status.
74	(2) Not to face discrimination by a State, county, or municipal agency.
75	(3) Not to face discrimination while seeking or maintaining housing due to the individual's lack of a
76	permanent address, the individual's address being that of a shelter or social service provider, or the individual's
77	housing status. This right does not, however, entitle an individual facing eviction to a truncated or expedited housing
78	application process that might limit consideration of the reason for eviction in an evaluation of the individual's
79	reliability as a tenant, nor does it prohibit a shelter from establishing and adhering to a policy relating to a maximum
80	length of stay for an individual in that shelter. This right does not preclude a landlord's consideration of any other
81	factor not enumerated herein that is permissible under State or federal law. This right does not preclude or limit

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enforcement of housing, building, and sanitation laws.

(4) Not to face discrimination while seeking temporary shelter because of race, color, religion, creed, age,
gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, marital status, familial status, disability, national origin, or housing status,
except in the case of temporary shelters specifically designated for a specific gender or familial status, or in the case of
funding sources that require certain populations to be served. This right does not introduce any new requirement with
regard to the obligation of shelters or other providers to update their facilities or provide new accommodations.
(5) To medical and dental care, free from discrimination based on the individual's housing status.
(6) To protection from unlawful disclosure of the individual's records and information provided to temporary
shelters, service providers, and State, county, municipal, and private entities, including the right to confidentiality of
personal records and information in accordance with all limitations on disclosure established by the Delaware
Community Management Information System, the federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of
1996, 42 U.S.C. §§ 1320d, et seq., and the federal Violence Against Women Act, 34 U.S.C. §§ 12291, et seq.
(7) The same reasonable expectation of privacy in the individual's personal property while residing in
temporary shelter as an individual residing in a permanent residence. This right may not, however, be construed to
prevent reasonable searches performed pursuant to posted rules.
(8) The same reasonable expectation of privacy in the individual's personal property while in public spaces as
an individual who is not experiencing homelessness. These rights may not be construed to prevent reasonable searches
otherwise conducted in accordance with the law, or to prevent nondiscriminatory enforcement of other laws, including
anti-loitering laws.
(9) To occupy a motor vehicle or recreational vehicle, provided that the vehicle is legally parked in a public
parking lot.
(10) To pray, meditate, worship, or practice religion in a public space without discrimination based on
housing status.
(11) To eat, drink, share, accept, or give food and non-alcoholic beverages in a public space in which having
food and beverages is not prohibited.
(b) A political subdivision of this State may not adopt any policy, including a law, ordinance, or regulation,
contrary to subsection (a) of this section.
(c) An individual may file a complaint alleging a discriminatory act with the Division as described in § 4508A of
this title. The Division shall enforce this section in the manner provided in this chapter.
(d) Violation of this section subjects the violator to the civil penalties provided in this chapter.

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112	(e) The rights set forth in this section are available only insofar as they are implemented in accordance with other
113	parts of State and federal law.
114	§ 4505A. Authority of the Commission to delegate.
115	(a) The Commission shall implement any of the provisions of this chapter that are not expressly vested in another
116	entity.
117	(b) The Commission may delegate to a panel of its members any power, duty, or function vested in it under this
118	chapter. No panel to which any power, duty, or function of the Commission is delegated may consist of fewer than 3
119	members of the Commission.
120	(c) The Commission may delegate to the Division any power, duty, or function vested in it under this chapter
121	unless the delegation is expressly prohibited. If the Commission delegates to the Division a power, duty, or function vested
122	in it under this chapter, the delegation shall specifically state the power, duty, or function being delegated.
123	(d) The Commission may not delegate to the Division the Commission's power or duty to conduct public hearings
124	or order relief.
125	§ 4506A. Commission's power to adopt rules.

128	(1) The way in which complaints must be investigated.
129	(2) The way in which other investigations under this chapter must be conducted.
130	(3) The way in which public hearings must be conducted.
131	(4) The general form and content of agreements and orders provided under this chapter.
132	(5) Other topics that the Commission considers appropriate to assist it in performing its duties and in carrying
133	out the purpose of this chapter.
134	§ 4507A. Education.
135	(a) The Commission and the Division shall conduct educational activities and conferences to further the purposes
136	of this chapter. The Commission and the Division shall issue reports on these.
137	(b) The Division shall endeavor to develop, with the advice of interested parties, programs of voluntary
138	compliance and enforcement. The Commission shall issue reports on its activities.
139	§ 4508A. Complaint procedure.
140	(a) An individual believing themself aggrieved by a discriminatory act may file with the Division a complaint, in
1/11	writing which states all of the following:

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142	(1) The individual's name.
143	(2) A description of where the alleged discriminatory act occurred, including the name of the place, if
144	applicable and known, and the location.
145	(3) The date, time, and a description of the alleged discriminatory act.
146	(4) If known, the name and address of each respondent.
147	(5) The signature of the individual.
148	(6) Any other information that the Division requires.
149	(b) A complaint may not be filed with the Division more than 90 days after the occurrence of the alleged
150	discriminatory act.
151	(c) Within 90 days after the complaint is filed, the Division shall investigate the complaint, and endeavor to
152	eliminate any unlawful discriminatory act discovered through conciliation unless the respondent is a law enforcement
153	officer or law enforcement agency, in which case the Division shall refer the matter to the applicable Internal Affairs
154	department as set out in subsection (d) of this section.
155	(1) If possible, a conciliation meeting will be held in the county where the alleged discriminatory act occurred.
156	(2) If the matter is resolved through conciliation, the parties shall enter a conciliation agreement stating the
157	terms of the resolution of the matter.
158	(3) If the Division determines that the allegations in the complaint do not state a claim for which relief is
159	available under this chapter or that the Division lacks jurisdiction, the Division may petition the Commission, with
160	notice to the complainant and the respondent, if the respondent has been served the complaint.
161	(d) When the party alleged to have engaged in a discriminatory act is a law enforcement officer or law
162	enforcement agency, the Division shall refer the matter to the applicable Internal Affairs department for further appropriate
163	investigation and resolution.
164	(e) When the Division has reasonable cause to believe that a respondent breached a conciliation agreement, the
165	Division shall refer the matter to the Attorney General with a recommendation that a civil action be filed under § 4511A of
166	this title for the enforcement of the conciliation agreement.
167	(f) If a complaint cannot be resolved through conciliation as provided in subsection (c) of this section, the
168	Commission shall appoint a panel to hold a public hearing within 60 days after the expiration of 90-day period for
169	investigation and conciliation. On a showing of good cause, the Commission Chair or the panel's chair may extend the
170	deadlines provided in subsection (c) of this section and this subsection at the request of a party or an employee of the

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Commission.

172	(g) Public hearings must be conducted in accordance with rules prescribed by the Commission. Each party may
173	appear in person, be represented by an attorney, present evidence, cross-examine witnesses, and obtain the issuance of
174	subpoenas under § 4509A of this title. The Delaware Rules of Evidence apply to the presentation of evidence in a public
175	hearing as the Rules would apply in an administrative hearing conducted in accordance with subchapter III of the
176	Administrative Procedures Act [Chapter 101 of Title 29]. A record kept of all public hearings, a transcript of which must be
177	provided at cost on request of a party. Decisions of the panel must be made by a majority of the members on the panel.
178	(h) If the panel determines that a violation of § 4504A of this title has not occurred, it shall issue an order
179	dismissing the complaint. The panel may award reasonable attorneys' fees, costs, and expenses to the respondent if the
180	panel determines that the complaint was brought for an improper purpose, such as to harass or embarrass the respondent.
181	(i) If the panel determines that a violation of § 4504A of this title has occurred, it shall issue an order stating its
182	findings of fact and conclusions of law and containing such relief as may be appropriate, including actual damages suffered
183	by the aggrieved individual, which may include damages caused by pain and suffering, costs, expenses, reasonable
184	attorneys' fees, and injunctive or other equitable relief. To vindicate the public interest, the panel may assess a civil penalty
185	against the respondent, to be paid to the Special Administration Fund as follows:
186	(1) In an amount not exceeding \$1,000 for each discriminatory act if the respondent has not been adjudged to
187	have committed any previous discriminatory acts under this chapter or does not satisfy paragraph (i)(2) or (i)(3) of this
188	section.
189	(2) In an amount not exceeding \$5,000 for each discriminatory act if the respondent has been adjudged to
190	have committed 1 other discriminatory act under this chapter during the 5-year period ending on the date that the
191	complaint was filed.
192	(3) In an amount not exceeding \$15,000 for each discriminatory act if the respondent has been adjudged to
193	have committed 2 or more discriminatory acts during the 7-year period ending on the date that the complaint was
194	<u>filed.</u>
195	(j) Copies of orders entered under subsections (h) and (i) of this section must be served personally or by registered
196	or certified mail to each party or their attorney.
197	(k) If the Division concludes, at any time following the filing of a complaint, that prompt judicial action is
198	necessary to carry out the purpose of this chapter, the Division may authorize a civil action for appropriate temporary or
199	preliminary relief pending final disposition of the complaint under this section. On receipt of the authorization to pursue a
200	civil action, the Attorney General may, in the absence of a conflict of duties, commence and maintain the civil action in the

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Court of Chancery on behalf of the Division. If the Attorney General does not commence the civil action, the Division may,

202	with the written authorization of the Secretary of State, employ special counsel to commence and maintain an action
203	notwithstanding § 2507 of Title 29. The commencement of a civil action under this subsection does not affect the initiation
204	or continuation of proceedings under this section.
205	(l) The Commission shall promulgate regulations that establish procedures for dismissal of complaints based on
206	lack of jurisdiction or failure to state a claim for which relief is available under this chapter. Notwithstanding the limitation
207	of delegation in § 4505A of this title, the Commission may authorize dismissal for lack of jurisdiction or failure to state a
208	claim for which relief is available by a single commissioner before the appointment of a panel.
209	(m) The Commission shall issue an annual report identifying organizations who have committed three or more
210	substantiated violations of § 4504A of this title in a 12 month period,
211	§ 4509A. Compelling the attendance of witnesses and production of documents, oaths, subpoenas.
212	(a) The Commission may issue subpoenas and order discovery in aid of investigations and hearings under this
213	chapter.
214	(1) The Commission Chair or the panel chair shall sign a subpoena issued under this subsection, and a sheriff,
215	deputy sheriff, constable, member of the Commission, or employee of the Division may serve the subpoena.
216	(2) Subpoenas and discovery may be ordered to the same extent and subject to the same limitations as would
217	apply if the subpoenas or discovery were ordered or served in aid of a civil action in the Superior Court, except that the
218	Attorney General shall first review the subpoenas and discovery in aid of investigations, to determine whether there is
219	reason to believe that there has been a violation of this chapter.
220	(b) At a public hearing, any member of the Commission may administer oaths to a witness who is called before the
221	Commission.
222	(c) A witness summoned by a subpoena under this chapter is entitled to the same witness and mileage fees as a
223	witness in proceedings in Superior Court.
224	(d) A person violates this section if the person fails or neglects to obey a subpoena or other lawful order under
225	subsection (a) of this section and had the power to obey the subpoena or order.
226	(1) The Attorney General, on behalf of the Commission, shall petition the Superior Court for an order
227	requiring the person to appear before the Commission to produce evidence or give testimony pertaining to the matter
228	under investigation or in question.
229	(2) The Attorney General shall file the petition under paragraph (d)(1) of this section in the county where the
230	person that is in violation of this section resides or conducts business.

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231	(3) The Superior Court may punish the person who violates an order issued under paragraph (d)(1) of this
232	section as being in contempt of court.
233	(e) (1) A person who has the power to obey a subpoena or other lawful order under paragraph (a) of this section
234	but willfully fails or neglects to do so is subject to a fine for each instance of failure to obey of not more than \$2,500 or
235	imprisonment of not more than 1 year, or both.
236	(2) A person who, with intent to mislead another person in any proceeding under this chapter, commits any of
237	the following is subject to a fine for each instance of not more than \$2,500 or imprisonment of not more than 1 year, or
238	<u>both:</u>
239	a. Intentionally makes or causes to be made a false entry or statement of fact in a report, account, record
240	or other document produced pursuant to a subpoena or other lawful order under paragraph (a) of this section.
241	b. Intentionally neglects or fails to make or cause to be made full, true, and correct entries in reports.
242	accounts, records, or other documents.
243	c. Intentionally mutilates, alters, or by any other means, falsifies documentary evidence.
244	§ 4510A. Judicial review.
245	(a) A party aggrieved by an order for relief under § 4508A of this chapter granting or denying, in whole or in part
246	the relief sought, may obtain a review of the order in the Superior Court in the county in which the discriminatory act is
247	alleged to have occurred, under the civil rules of that Court and the Administrative Procedures Act [Chapter 101 of Title
248	29]. An aggrieved party must file the petition for review not later than 30 days of the day the notice of the decision was
249	mailed or delivered. The review shall be conducted in accordance with the Administrative Procedures Act.
250	(b) A party to a proceeding before the panel may intervene in the appeal process in the Superior Court.
251	(c) The Superior Court may not consider an objection that was not made before the panel, unless the failure or
252	neglect to object is excused because of extraordinary circumstances or when the interests of justice so require.
253	(d) If the Attorney General has not commenced a civil action within 60 days of notice of breach of a Commission
254	order or conciliation agreement as authorized by § 4511A of this title, an aggrieved party may commence an action in the
255	Superior Court or Court of Chancery, or both, seeking enforcement and appropriate relief within the court's subject matter
256	jurisdiction, including conversion of a Commission order conferring monetary relief to a judgment subject to execution
257	The Court may also award the aggrieved party reasonable costs and attorneys' fees in connection with the enforcement
258	action.
259	§ 4511A. Enforcement by the Attorney General.

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260	(a) The Attorney General may commence a civil action in the Superior Court, Court of Chancery, or both, in any
261	county of the State for appropriate relief within the court's subject matter jurisdiction, including equitable relief, monetary
262	damages, reasonable attorneys' fees, costs, and expenses, if the Attorney General has reasonable cause to believe that any of
263	the following has occurred:
264	(1) A person is engaging in a pattern of discriminatory acts in violation of this chapter.
265	(2) A person has been denied any of the rights granted by this chapter and the denial of rights raises an issue
266	of general public importance.
267	(3) A party to a conciliation agreement has breached the conciliation agreement.
268	(b) To vindicate the public interest, the court may assess a civil penalty to be paid to the Special Administration
269	Fund in an amount not exceeding \$25,000 for a first violation of this chapter and in an amount not exceeding \$50,000 for a
270	subsequent violation of this chapter.
271	(c) When a civil action is initiated by the Attorney General pursuant to this section, no Court shall charge fees of
272	any kind in such proceeding to the Attorney General, the Commission or any of its members.
273	§ 4512A. Criminal jurisdiction.
274	The Superior Court shall have exclusive original jurisdiction over all criminal violations of this chapter.
275	\$4513A. Recovery of damages for abuse of process.
276	(a) A respondent may maintain an action, claim, cross-claim, or counter-claim to recover damages, including
277	costs and attorney's fees from any person who commenced or continued a complaint against respondent without a
278	substantial basis in fact or law and which could not be supported by a substantial argument for the extension, modification,
279	or reversal of existing law.
280	(b) Punitive damages may only be recovered upon an additional demonstration that the complaint was commenced
281	or continued recklessly or with intent to harm respondent.
282	(c) Nothing in this section shall affect or preclude the right of any party to any recovery otherwise authorized by
283	<u>law.</u>
284	Section 2. Amend Chapter 30, Title 31 of the Delaware Code by making deletions as shown by strike through and
285	insertions as shown by underline as follows:
286	§ 3004. Powers and duties.
287	The Commission shall cooperate with the Governor, the General Assembly, public agencies, officials, firms,
288	corporations, civic groups, and individuals in promoting amicable relationships among the various racial and cultural
289	groups within the State. To this end the Commission may do any of the following:

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290	(4) Perform duties assigned to the Commission under Chapter 45 45, 45A, and 46 of Title 6.
291	§ 3005. Special Administration Fund.
292	(a) Creation. A special fund in the State Treasury, to be known as the Special Administration Fund of the Human
293	and Civil Rights Commission and referred to as "the Fund" throughout this section, consists of:
294	(1) All civil penalties assessed and collected under Chapter 45-45, 45A, or 46 of Title 6.
295	(2) Costs, attorneys' fees, and expenses awarded to the Commission under Chapter 45 45, 45A, or 46 of Title
296	6.
297	(b) Administration.
298	(1) All moneys collected under this section must be deposited or paid into the Fund, are continuously
299	available to the Commission for expenditure in accordance with this section, do not lapse at any time, and may not be
300	transferred to any other fund, except as provided in subsection (d) of this section. All moneys in the Fund must be
301	prudently invested to the credit of the Fund, administered and disbursed in the same manner as is provided by law fo
302	other special funds in the State Treasury, and maintained in a separate ledger account on the books of the Secretary o
303	Finance.
304	(2) All moneys in the Fund which are received from the federal government, or any of its agencies, o
305	appropriated by this State for purposes described in this chapter or Chapters 45-45, 45A, or 46 of Title 6, may be
306	expended solely for the proper and efficient administration of this chapter.
307	(c) Use. The Commission may use moneys in the Fund for any of the following purposes:
308	(1) The payment of litigation expenses, costs, and attorneys' fees in connection with the enforcemen
309	provisions of Chapters 45-45, 45A, and 46 of Title 6.
310	(2) The payment of the expenses of investigations conducted under Chapters 45-45, 45A, and 46 of Title 6
311	and this chapter.
312	Section 3. This Act is effective immediately and is to be implemented the earlier of the following:
313	(1) One year from the date of the Act's enactment.
314	(2) Notice by the Chair of the Commission, published in the Register of Regulations, that final regulations to
315	implement this Act have been promulgated.

SYNOPSIS

This Act ensures that all individuals, regardless of housing status, have equal opportunity to live in decent, safe, sanitary, and healthful accommodations and enjoy equality of opportunities. To that end, this Act sets forth the rights of individuals experiencing homelessness, many of which are existing constitutional rights, and creates a process by which the State Human and Civil Rights Commission and the Division of Human and Civil Rights may accept and investigate complaints of discriminatory treatment, attempt conciliation, and refer enforcement actions to law enforcement Internal Affairs if necessary. These entities already exist and administer Delaware's Fair Housing and Equal Accommodations laws.

This act is intended to prohibit discrimination on the sole basis that one is experiencing homelessness. It does not give preferential treatment to those experiencing homelessness, but merely prohibits discriminatory treatment.

The complaint process requires that conciliation is attempted before a public hearing is held, as set forth in lines 151-160 and 167-169.

This Act is a successor to House Bill No. 55, and differs from that bill in the following ways:

- 1) The new Chapter it creates is entitled "Anti-Discrimination Provisions for Individuals Experiencing Homelessness" instead of "Bill of Rights for Individuals Experiencing Homelessness."
 - 2) Defines the term reasonable search.
- 3) Expands the definition of "individuals experiencing homelessness" to include those who may be staying with different friends or family without a permanent home.
 - 4) Eliminates a reference to voting rights, since such rights are addressed elsewhere in the Code.
- 5) Clarifies that the right to seek or maintain housing does not preclude or limit a municipality's enforcement of its housing, building, and sanitation laws.
- 6) Changes the right to occupy a motor vehicle or recreational vehicle, provided that the vehicle is legally parked "on public property" to "in a public parking lot."
- 7) Confirms that the right to be free from discrimination by landlords on the basis of experiencing homelessness does not preclude a landlord's consideration of any other factor that is permissible under State or federal law.
- 8) Removes the provision that the Commission and the Division may consult with state, county, and municipal officials, and other interested parties, to learn the extent, if any, to which discriminatory acts exist in the State, county, or municipality, and whether and how state, county, or municipal enforcement programs might be utilized to combat the discrimination.
 - 9) Mandates reporting on the Division's educational activities.
- 10) Provides that upon preliminary confirmation that the party alleged to have engaged in a discriminatory act is a law enforcement officer or law enforcement agency, the Division shall refer the matter to the applicable Internal Affairs department (instead of the Department of Justice) for further appropriate investigation and resolution.
- 11) Provides that the Commission shall issue an annual report identifying organizations who has committed three or more substantiated violations of § 4504A of this title in a 12 month period.
 - 12) Clarifies that judicial review is done in accordance with the Administrative Procedures Act.
- 13) Provides respondents with a cause of action for damages, including attorneys' fees, costs, and punitive damages, against a complainant who abuses the process set forth in the act.

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
