SENATE BILL NO. 175

AN ACT TO AMEND TITLE 14 RELATING TO ELIGIBILITY FOR SEED GRANTS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF DELAWARE:

1 Section 1. Amend § 3403A, Title 14 of the Delaware Code by making deletions as shown by strike
2 through and insertions as shown by underline as follows:

3 § 3403A Administration.

4 (a) This subchapter shall be administered by the institution where the student is enrolled or has sought
5 admission.

6 (b) Each institution shall adopt such rules and regulations as it deems necessary and proper to the
7 administration of this subchapter. Such rules and regulations may include an appeals process to grant
8 exceptions to the eligibility requirements set forth in § 3404A(a)(6) of this title for applicants who are unable
9 to attend classes in the fall semester immediately after graduation from high school due to military service,
10 participation in a full-time volunteer service program, or a documented medical condition. Admission deferrals
11 of up to 1 calendar year in duration may be offered to those students who defer admission due to military
12 service, participation in a full-time volunteer service program, or a documented medical condition. Upon
13 passage of 1 year, students may appeal for an admission deferral for 1 additional consecutive year.

14 (c) Each institution shall annually report to the General Assembly of the State the names of its own
15 students enrolled in the SEED program and the total amount of expenditures made under this subchapter. The
16 report must identify which of those students enrolled in the program pursue a bachelor's degree after
17 completion of an associate degree.

18 Section 2. Amend § 3406A, Title 14 of the Delaware Code by making deletions as shown by strike through and
19 insertions as shown by underline as follows:

20 § 3406A Maintaining eligibility.

21 (a) To maintain continued State payment of tuition once enrolled at Delaware Technical and Community
22 College or the University of Delaware, Associate in Arts program, the student shall meet all of the following:

- 23 (1) Make steady academic progress toward an associate degree, earning not less than the
24 minimum number of hours of credit required for full-time standing in each academic year.
- 25 (2) Maintain continuous enrollment for not less than 2 semesters in each successive academic
26 year, unless granted an exception for cause by the institution.
- 27 (3) Have a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.5 calculated on a 4.0 scale at the end of
28 the first academic year and thereafter maintain such a cumulative grade point average. The institution
29 may grant exceptions upon appeal.
- 30 (4) The student and family shall certify that the student has not been convicted of any felony.
- 31 (b) Grants made by the SEED program shall not be allowed for courses or other post-secondary units
32 repeated or taken in excess of the requirements for completion of an associate degree with the exception of those
33 courses required by the institution for program admission and courses taken pursuant to the Associates in Arts
34 program.
- 35 (c) Students are eligible to participate in this program for a period not to exceed 6 continuous semesters,
36 not including the summer semester. A student who completes an associate degree in less than the 6 continuous
37 semesters can apply the remaining semesters of the student's grant toward a bachelor's degree at the University of
38 Delaware or the Delaware Technical and Community College.

SYNOPSIS

Currently, the SEED program allows students a maximum of 6 semesters to complete an Associate Degree. This Bill allows SEED eligible students who complete their Associate Degree in fewer than 6 semesters to apply the remaining semesters of the grant toward a Bachelor's Degree at either the University of Delaware or Delaware Technical and Community College.
