June 30, 2000

AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR CERTAIN GRANTS-IN-AID FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2001; SPECIFYING CERTAIN PROCEDURES, CONDITIONS AND LIMITATIONS FOR THE EXPENDITURE OF SUCH FUNDS; AMENDING THE FISCAL YEAR 2001 APPROPRIATIONS ACT; AND AMENDING CERTAIN PERTINENT STATUTORY PROVISIONS.

6	Section 5. Section 2 of this Act appropriates \$157,500 to the Delaware State Fair. Of that
7	amount, \$100,000 shall be used for prizes for achievements in agriculture, animal raising and in works
8	of manual training and the domestic arts to be awarded at the annual State Fair and shall be paid by the
9	State Treasurer at the beginning of the first quarter of Fiscal Year 2001. Of the remaining \$57,500,
10	\$5,000 shall be used for purses on Governor's Day and the remaining \$52,500 shall be paid in
11	quarterly allotments, as provided in Chapter 65, Section 6505 of Title 29, Delaware Code.
12	
13	Section 6. The appropriation in Section 2 of this Act to Camp Barnes, Inc. shall be used for
14	the purpose of maintaining and operating Camp Barnes for the recreation of deserving youths from
15	throughout the State.
16	
17	Section 7. The sums appropriated to the various Senior Centers in Section 1 of this Act shall
18	be made available to the Division of Aging in order to meet the State's matching requirement for
19	federal funds appropriated under the Older Americans Act of 1965, as amended. Those senior centers
20	receiving funds under the Older Americans Act of 1965, as amended, shall present to the Division of
21	Aging a proposal for expenditure of State funds. The proposal submitted to the Division of Aging
22	shall be prepared in accordance with the guidelines established for the administration of programs
23	under the Older Americans Act.
24	
25	Section 8. In order to be considered for a Grant-in-Aid Appropriation under Section 1 or
26	Section 2 of this Act, an agency must meet the following criteria:
27	1. Be incorporated, non-profit (or under umbrella of parent organization which is
28	incorporated, non-profit);

1	2. Have By-laws that clearly state the purpose of the Corporation and include definition
2	of duties of Board of Directors;
3	3. Have an active, community-represented, volunteer Board of Directors that sets
4	policies, goals and objectives, and maintains minutes of regularly scheduled meetings
5	and any special meetings;
6	4. Have programs that are unduplicated and satisfy unmet human needs of the
7	community;
8	5. Have personnel policies including job descriptions and classifications;
9	6. Employ no member of the General Assembly on a salaried basis or in exchange for
10	any emolument. Any elected official who was employed by an organization which
11	received a Grant-in-Aid prior to their election shall be exempt from this provision;
12	7. Have competent executives, competent staffing and reasonable facilities;
13	8. Practice non-discrimination;
14	9. Have accounting (budget) procedures and an annual audit;
15	10. Use funds in accordance with the application;
16	11. Demonstrate community support;
17	12. Request funds only for a program which does not receive full funding from other sources
18	of revenue.
19	
20	Section 9. (a) No funds appropriated in this Act shall be expended in a political campaign or
21	for partisan political purposes.
22	(b) No funds appropriated in this Act may be used to hire lobbyists.
23	
24	Section 10. The Controller General may from time to time contract for or conduct
25	performance and/or financial audits of any non-state agency for which funds are appropriated in this
26	Act.
27	

1	Section 11. Funds appropriated in this Act shall not be used by any agency to provide child
2	day care. It is the intent of the General Assembly that no funds will be appropriated in Fiscal Years
3	2001 and 2002 in grants-in-aid to agencies for the purchase of capital equipment, relocation,
4	rehabilitation, renovation or purchase of buildings. Organizations will not be eligible for
5	consideration of a grant-in-aid appropriation unless they have been incorporated and operating for a
6	two-year period prior to June 30th of the fiscal year in which they apply for funding for the following
7	fiscal year.
8	
9	Section 12. Paragraph (d), Chapter 65, Title 29, Delaware Code, provides that monies
10	appropriated for grants-in-aid in Fiscal Year 2001 shall be paid in quarterly installments. For Fiscal
11	Year 2001, such payments will be made on July 25, October 1, January 1, and April 1. Upon
12	notification by the Chairman of the Joint Finance Committee, the State Treasurer shall be directed to
13	withhold such installment payment(s). An installment payment may be delayed or withheld if the
14	grant-in-aid recipient because of, but not limited to, the following:
15	(a) Has not submitted a quarterly statement of expenditures if required to do so;
16	(b) Expended funds from the grant-in-aid for purposes not intended by the General Assembly;
17	(c) Expended funds for day care, purchase of capital equipment, relocation, renovation,
18	rehabilitation or purchase of buildings;
19	(d) Failure to pay Corporation Franchise Tax; and
20	(e) Agency is no longer in operation.
21	
22	Section 13. (a) It is the intent of the General Assembly that each Grant-in-Aid recipient shall
23	submit one of the following with its application for a grant award in Fiscal Year 2002:
24	(i) An audit prepared by a Certified Public Accountant covering the prior full fiscal year
25	of the receiving agency, or
26	(ii) Balance Sheet reflecting total Assets, Liabilities, and Fund Balances covering the
27	prior fiscal year of the receiving agency; Statements of Support, Revenue and
28	Expenses and Changes in Fund Balances covering the prior fiscal year of the

1	receiving agency; and Statements of Functional Expenses covering the prior fiscal
2	year of the receiving agency.
3	(b) Fire companies listed in this Act shall submit financial information on the form approved by
4	the State Treasurer, the Budget Director and the Controller General. The listed fire companies are exempt
5	from the provisions of Subsection (a) of this Section.
6	(c) Veterans' organizations in Subsection (4) of this Act are exempt from the provisions of this
7	Section.
8	(d) Recipients of the appropriations for Aid to Local Law Enforcement shall be exempt from the
9	provisions of this Section.
10	(e) Non-compliance by a Grant-in-Aid recipient with the provisions of this Section shall
11	automatically disqualify the applicant for consideration of a Grant-in-Aid award in Fiscal Year 2002.
12	(f) For Fiscal Year 2001, it is the legislative intent that a Grant-in-Aid recipient listed in Sections
13	1 or 2 of this Act shall not be entitled to receive any of the funds appropriated by this Act unless certain
14	financial information has been received by the Office of the Controller General on or before July 25,
15	2000. Such financial information shall be in the form as defined in Subsection (a)(i) or Subsection (a)(ii)
16	of this Section covering full fiscal year of the receiving agency. If any Grant-in-Aid recipient fails to
17	comply with this Subsection (f) the funds appropriated by this Act to that recipient shall revert to the
18	General Fund of the State.
19	
20	Section 14. This Act is a supplementary appropriation and the monies appropriated shall be paid
21	by the State Treasurer from General Fund monies not otherwise appropriated. Any funds remaining
22	unexpended or unencumbered by the State Treasurer as of June 30, 2001, shall revert to the General Fund
23	of the State of Delaware.
24 25	Section 15. (a) The State Treasurer is authorized to take the necessary steps to make a total
26	payment of the appropriation in Section 2 of this Act at the beginning of the first quarter of Fiscal Year
27	2001 for the agencies as follows:

15	(b) The State Treasurer is authorized to take the necessary steps to make a total payment of the
16	appropriation in Section 1 of this Act at the beginning of the first quarter of Fiscal Year 2001 for the

18	(c) The State Treasurer is authorized to take the necessary steps to make a total payment of the
19	appropriation to any Grant-in-Aid recipient receiving an amount of \$6,000 or less listed in Section 2 of
20	this Act at the beginning of the first quarter of Fiscal Year 2001.
21	(d) The State Treasurer is authorized to take the necessary steps to make a total payment of the
22	appropriation to fire companies listed in Section 3 of this Act at the beginning of the first quarter of
23 24	Fiscal Year 2001.
25	Section 16. (a) Section 2 of this Act appropriates a one-time item to the Department of Public
26	Safety - Aid to Local Law Enforcement in the amount of one million four hundred thousand dollars
27	(\$1,400,000) for the purpose of contracting with local law enforcement agencies for Emergency Illegal
28	Drug Enforcement programs.
29	(b) There is hereby established a Drug Emergency Fund for Local Law Enforcement Agencies to
30	be administered by the State Aid to Local Law Enforcement Committee (SALLE) and disbursed by the
31	Department of Public Safety under authorized contracts.
32	(c) Local law enforcement agencies are encouraged to develop and maintain increased programs
33	to combat illegal drug manufacturing, sale, and abuse. The Department of Public Safety may contract
34	with any local law enforcement agency which qualifies under standards established by the SALLE
35	Committee to establish and maintain emergency programs to increase their efforts to combat illegal drug

use and abuse. No part of this appropriation may be used to supplant funds already committed by a local

Committee, to support a pool arrangement to fund a contiguous area served by more than one local law
enforcement agency.

(f) Each local law enforcement agency contracting for an allocation shall, not later than April 1,
2001, report in detail the plan under which such funds are being expended, and any other information
requested by the SALLE Committee. The SALLE Committee shall report to the General Assembly of the
State of Delaware on or before May 1, 2001, as to the agencies that were awarded grants from these
funds, the amount of the grant, and the purpose of the grant.

(g) Copies of the minutes of all regular meetings and any special meetings of the SALLE
Committee shall be forwarded in a timely manner to the Office of the Controller General.

18 Section 17. Section 1 of this Act makes an appropriation to the Department of Health & Social 19 Services, Public Health, Emergency Medical Services (35-05-30), for the state component of the 20 operational costs associated with each county's paramedic service for Advanced Life Support. These 21 funds shall be disbursed by Emergency Medical Services on a quarterly basis to counties that operate 22 approved programs.

Emergency Medical Services shall have an audit performed by the State Auditor annually to insure that reimbursement to the counties for the State share of costs was for approved Advanced Life Support Services. Adjustments shall be made to the final quarterly reimbursement based on the audit results.

11	Section 20. For Fiscal Year 2001, direct paramedic initial training, recertification training and
12	testing for the Statewide paramedic program shall be offered at a single site.

14	Section 21. Section 1 of this Act appropriates funds to Aid to Local Law Enforcement. These
15	funds shall be distributed based on (a) \$3,000 to each police agency; (b) any funds in excess of "(a)"
16	based on the ratio of the number of police officers each police agency has to the total number of police in
17	all agencies.
18	
19	Section 22. Section 2 of this Act appropriates funds to Eastlawn Area Human Services, Inc.
20	None of these funds, nor any Federal, State or Local Government funds, shall be expended for the
21	purchase of television, cable T.V. and/or radio broadcasting services.
22	
23	Section 23. Section 2 of this Act appropriates funds to the Delaware State Police Museum, Inc.
24	These funds may not be used for capital/construction costs.
25	

1	Section 24. For Fiscal Year 2001, the Bridgeville Senior Center shall submit to the Joint Finance
2	Committee on September 15, 2000, December 15, 2000, and March 15, 2001, a report reflecting income
3	and expenditures for the Fiscal Year 2001, and average daily attendance at the senior center or senior
4	center activities.
5 6	Section 25. Section 2 of this Act makes a one-time appropriation of \$100,000 to the Delaware
7	Health Care Commission (10-05-03) to support loan repayment and/or the recruitment for dentists.
8 9	Section 26. Section 2 of this Act appropriates \$198,500 to the Elsmere Recreation, Inc. Of this
10	amount, \$15,000 shall be used to support the Elsmere Boxing Club.
11 12	Section 27. Section 2 of this Act appropriates \$75,000 to "Slam Dunk to the Beach" – National
13	Holiday Basketball Invitation. Of that amount, \$500 in scholarships shall be made available to each team
14	participating in the annual tournament. A separate account shall be maintained for scholarship funds.
