HOUSE BILL NO. 302

AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR CERTAIN GRANTS-IN-AID FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2004; SPECIFYING CERTAIN PROCEDURES, CONDITIONS AND LIMITATIONS FOR THE EXPENDITURE OF SUCH FUNDS; AMENDING THE FISCAL YEAR 2004 APPROPRIATIONS ACT; AND AMENDING CERTAIN PERTINENT STATUTORY PROVISIONS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF DELAWARE (Three-fourths of all members elected to each house thereof concurring therein):

893	11. Request funds only for a program, which does not receive, full funding from other sources of
894	revenue.

896	Section 6. (a) No funds appropriated in this Act shall be expended in a political campaign or for partisan
897	political purposes.
898	(b) No funds appropriated in this Act may be used to hire lobbyists.

900	Section 7. The Controller General may from time to time contract for or conduct performance and/or
901	financial audits of any non-state agency for which funds are appropriated in this Act.

903	Section 8. Funds appropriated in this Act shall not be used by any agency to provide child day care. It is the
904	intent of the General Assembly that no funds will be appropriated in Fiscal Years 2004 and 2005 in grants-in-aid to

925	Section 10. (a) It is the intent of the General Assembly that each Grant-in-Aid recipient shall submit one of the
926	following with its application for a grant award in Fiscal Year 2004:
927	(i) An audit prepared by a Certified Public Accountant covering the prior full fiscal year of the

929	(ii) Balance Sheet reflecting total Assets, Liabilities, and Fund Balances covering the prior fiscal

960	Finance Committee based upon its evaluation and with advice from the University of Delaware Institute for Public	
961	Administration.

963	Section 13. Section 1 of this Act makes an appropriation to the Department of Health & Social Services, Public	
964	Health, Emergency Medical Services (35-05-30), for the state component of the operational costs associated with each	
965	county's paramedic service for Advanced Life Support. These funds shall be disbursed by Emergency Medical Services	
966	on a quarterly basis to counties that operate approved programs.	
967	Emergency Medical Services shall have an audit performed by the State Auditor annually to insure that	
968	reimbursement to the counties for the State share of costs was for approved Advanced Life Support Services.	
969	Adjustments shall be made to the final quarterly reimbursement based on the audit results.
