SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2

A RESOLUTION REQUIRING THE DELAWARE DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES AND ENVIRONMENTAL CONTROL AND THE DELAWARE SOLID WASTE AUTHORITY TO DELAY THE ENFORCEMENT OF THE YARD WASTE BAN FOR CHERRY ISLAND LANDFILL UNTIL JANUARY 15, 2008 AND TO UNDERTAKE A NUMBER OF ACTIVITIES THAT WILL RESULT IN A SUITABLE YARD WASTE RECYCLING PROGRAM FOR NORTHERN NEW CASTLE COUNTY.

1           WHEREAS, the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control (DNREC) issued Permit SW-06/01  
2 to the Delaware Solid Waste Authority (DSWA) on January 6, 2006 allowing the expansion of Cherry Island Landfill to  
3 195 feet, an increase of 23 feet; and

4           WHEREAS, continued disposal of yard waste would require an increase of at least six feet – approximately 25  
5 percent higher than the permitted height increase; and

6           WHEREAS, Permit SW-06/01 included a condition banning the disposal of yard waste at Cherry Island Landfill  
7 effective January 1, 2007; and

8           WHEREAS, 23 other states and numerous local governments have implemented a ban on yard waste being  
9 disposed of in landfills; and

10           WHEREAS, approximately 19 percent of the municipal solid waste being disposed of at Cherry Island Landfill  
11 has been yard waste; and

12           WHEREAS, Delaware is a net importer of compost and yard waste is a reusable resource that can be converted to  
13 compost and utilized in Delaware; and

14           WHEREAS, the expansion of Cherry Island Landfill will cost an estimated \$100 million, or approximately \$4.6  
15 million per foot; and

16           WHEREAS, the capacity at Cherry Island Landfill is a valuable economic asset that should be used for waste that  
17 can not otherwise be reused or recycled; and

18           WHEREAS, The Solid Waste Management Technical Working Group recommended a ban be imposed to prohibit  
19 the disposal of yard waste at all of the state's landfills and concluded that it would be extremely difficult if not impossible  
20 to construct a new landfill in Northern New Castle County; and

21 WHEREAS, it is estimated that the life of Cherry Island Landfill could be extended by several years by  
22 eliminating the disposal of yard waste into the landfill at current overall recycling rates.

23 WHEREAS, residents of New Castle County are concerned that there is not a comprehensive solution for  
24 unlimited yard waste recycling; and

25 WHEREAS, residents of New Castle County and the trash haulers have been uncertain regarding the issues of  
26 pricing and transportation;

27 NOW THEREFORE:

28 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the 144<sup>th</sup> General Assembly of the State of  
29 Delaware, with the approval of the Governor, that the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control and the  
30 Delaware Solid Waste Authority are directed to the delay the enforcement of the yard waste ban until January 15, 2008.

31 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that DNREC and DSWA shall continue to meet with trash haulers and yard waste  
32 businesses and the Recycling Public Advisory Council for the purpose of developing a program that will simplify and  
33 economize yard waste recycling for the residents of New Castle County.

34 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that DNREC and DSWA shall work with all necessary partners to open and  
35 operate, as long as feasible, at least three demonstration community yard waste sites which shall be available to the public  
36 for disposal and recovery of residential yard waste.

37 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that DNREC shall identify and coordinate activities with private, commercial  
38 yard waste processing operations to assure that all such operations are appropriately permitted, if needed, and able to accept  
39 yard waste from residents and commercial haulers by December 31, 2007.

40 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that DNREC and DSWA shall work closely with commercial trash haulers and  
41 others yard waste hauling businesses operating in Northern New Castle County to assure that, to the maximum extent  
42 practicable, all residents have cost effective options available for yard waste collection.

43 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that DSWA shall continue to accept, at rates established by DSWA, yard waste  
44 from the public and licensed waste haulers.

45 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that DNREC and DSWA will implement and assist, as appropriate and feasible, in  
46 marketing and educational efforts to advertise public and private options for collection, recycling and disposal of yard  
47 waste.

48 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in order to assess progress toward efficient and effective implementation of  
49 the yard waste ban on January 15, 2008, DNREC and DSWA shall jointly submit written reports to the General Assembly  
50 no later than June 30, September 15 and December 15 2007. The reports shall summarize progress on activities identified in

51 this resolution. The General Assembly, at its discretion, may hold hearings to assess such progress and determine any other  
52 actions that may need to be undertaken.

#### SYNOPSIS

This Concurrent Resolution directs DNREC and DSWA to delay the ban on yard waste disposal at the Cherry Island Landfill until January 15, 2008.
