SENATE BILL NO. 130

A BOND AND CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS ACT OF THE STATE OF DELAWARE AND CERTAIN OF ITS AUTHORITIES FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2012; AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS OF THE STATE; APPROPRIATING FUNDS FROM THE TRANSPORTATION TRUST FUND; APPROPRIATING SPECIAL FUNDS OF THE DELAWARE TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY; DEAUTHORIZING AND REAUTHORIZING CERTAIN FUNDS OF THE TRANSPORTATION TRUST FUND; APPROPRIATING GENERAL FUNDS AND SPECIAL FUNDS OF THE STATE; REVERTING AND REPROGRAMMING CERTAIN FUNDS OF THE STATE; DIRECTING THE DEPOSIT OF CERTAIN FUNDS TO THE GENERAL FUND; SPECIFYING CERTAIN PROCEDURES, CONDITIONS AND LIMITATIONS FOR THE EXPENDITURE OF SUCH FUNDS; AMENDING CERTAIN PERTINENT STATUTORY PROVISIONS; AND AMENDING THE LAWS OF DELAWARE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF DELAWARE (Three-fourths of all members elected to each house thereof concurring therein):

1 The General Assembly hereby authorizes the following projects in the following amounts for the purposes set
2 forth in this Section and as described in the Fiscal Year 2012 Governor's Recommended Capital Budget and Project
3 Information document. Any authorization balance (excluding Transportation Trust Fund balances) remaining unexpended
4 or unencumbered by June 30, 2014, shall be subject to reversion or reauthorization.

1 Section 2. Authorization of Twenty-Year Bonds. The state hereby authorizes the issuance of
2 bonds, to which the state shall pledge its full faith and credit, such bonds to be issued in such principal
3 amount as necessary to provide proceeds to the state in the amount of \$171,145,000 and in the amount of
4 \$35,922,454 local share of school bonds. Bonds authorized to be used by this Section shall mature not later
5 than 20 years from their date of issuance. The proceeds of such bonds, except for local share of school
6 bonds, are hereby appropriated for a portion of the purposes set forth in the Section 1 Addendum of this Act
7 and summarized as follows:

23 Section 14. Continuing Fiscal Year 2011 General Fund Appropriations. Amend 77 Del. Laws, c.

25 Section 15. Abandoned Property. Amend 29 Del. C. § 6102(s) by deleting “24,000,000” and
26 inserting in lieu thereof “40,000,000”.

27 Section 16. Resource, Conservation and Development Transfers - Project Funds Transfer from
28 Prior Fiscal Years to Fiscal Year 2012. Within the same county, any Twenty-First Century funds or match
29 remaining from completed projects as authorized as part of the Twenty-First Century Resource,
30 Conservation and Development (RCD) project list pursuant to prior appropriations may be utilized for
31 RCD projects in the Fiscal Year 2012 list of projects approved as part of the Fiscal Year 2012 Bond and
32 Capital Improvements Act.

33 Section 17. Conservation Districts - Federal Acquisition Regulations. Conservation Districts shall
34 not be required to follow the provisions of the Federal Acquisition Regulations unless specifically required
35 under a contract(s) with a federal agency or federal grant. If the Conservation Districts are required to
36 follow subpart 31.2 of the Federal Acquisition Regulations, then the Conservation District(s) are hereby

1 authorized to charge an additional ten percent to their overhead cost rate to enable the Conservation
2 District(s) to continue to fulfill their statutory duties and responsibilities.

3 Section 18. Conservation Districts - Rollover of Funds. If projects are discontinued and have
4 Twenty-First Century funding associated with them, the associated Twenty-First Century funding would
5 remain within the County from which the project originated and would roll over as new Fiscal Year 2012
6 funds for allocation among the remaining projects within that County.

7 Section 19. First State Preservation Revolving Fund, Inc. For Fiscal Year 2012, First State
8 Preservation Revolving Fund, Inc. may continue to expend for administrative expenses the interest
9 generated by the Community Redevelopment Fund appropriations of \$250,000 in each of Fiscal Years 1999
10 and 2000.

11 Section 20. Downtown Milford Inc. Any Community Redevelopment Fund appropriations to
12 Downtown Milford Inc.- Structural and Façade Improvements may be used for private businesses and
13 residences, as well as, institutional residences provided said properties are within the Downtown Milford
14 project area.

15 Section 21. Laurel Redevelopment Corporation. Any proceeds from the sale of property funded in
16 whole or in part from Community Redevelopment Fund grants to Laurel Redevelopment Corporation shall
17 be reinvested in redevelopment projects within the Town of Laurel.

18 Section 22. Community Redevelopment Fund Match. Notwithstanding the provisions of 29 Del.
19 C. § 6102(A), any unexpended Community Redevelopment Funds awarded to the Hockessin Community
20 Center in fiscal years 2004 and 2005 shall not require a local match.

21 Section 23. Bond Bill Reporting Requirements. All state agencies and public school districts
22 receiving funds from the Bond and Capital Improvements Act shall submit a quarterly expenditure status
23 report to the Director of the Office of Management and Budget and Controller General on all incomplete
24 projects that are wholly or partially funded with state and/or local funds, including bond funds. The format
25 and information required in these quarterly reports shall include, but not be limited to, expenditures of both
26 bond and cash funds. The report format will be developed by the Office of Management and Budget and

1 include information as needed by the Department of Finance, Treasurer’s Office and Office of Management
2 and Budget to anticipate cash and bond requirements for the upcoming fiscal year.

3 Section 24. Notification. The Director of the Office of Management and Budget and Controller
4 General shall notify affected state agencies and other instrumentalities of the State as to certain relevant
5 provisions of this Act. Additionally, the Director of the Office of Management and Budget and Controller
6 General shall notify the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House as to any
7 legislative appointments required by this Act.

8 Section 25. Bear Babe Ruth. Notwithstanding any provision or requirement of the public trust
9 doctrine or 10 Del. C. c. 82, and without the necessity of compliance therewith, New Castle County is
10 hereby authorized to transfer to Bear Babe Ruth all rights, title and interest in that certain tract, piece, parcel
11 or parcels of land known as Lot 3, Wrangle Hill Elementary School, containing 68.008 acres, more or less,
12 and having Tax Parcel No. 12-013.00-081, as were conveyed to New Castle County by deed of Premcor
13 Refining Group Inc. (“Premcor”) dated March 12, 2007, or by any subsequent deed or consent executed by
14 a successor or assign of Premcor, subject to the condition that such property be used by Bear Babe Ruth for
15 the sole purpose of establishing operating and maintaining thereon a public park for open space, park or
16 outdoor recreational uses.

17 Section 26. Twenty-First Century Fund. Amend 70 Del. Laws, C. 210 by deleting the number
18 “2011” as it appears on line 359, page 13 and substituting in lieu thereof the number “2014”.

1 **OFFICE OF MANAGEMENT AND BUDGET**

2 Section 27. Construction Management. Notwithstanding any other State law, the Office of
3 Management and Budget (OMB) shall be responsible for the design and construction of all the projects
4 listed under Office of Management and Budget in the Section 1 Addendum of this Act. For those projects
5 that are solely for the purchase of equipment, including projects that are funded in any MCI and Equipment
6 line or any MCI line, OMB shall transfer the appropriate funding necessary to purchase the equipment to
7 the agency for which the equipment is being purchased. The appropriate amount of funding shall be
8 determined and agreed to by OMB and the agency for which the equipment is being purchased by
9 September 1 of each fiscal year. For those projects for which the appropriation is passed to an entity and
10 for which the State is not a party to the construction contract, OMB shall provide technical assistance.

11 (a) Notwithstanding any other State law, there is hereby created an Appeals Board, to be composed
12 of the Lieutenant Governor, the Director of the Office of Management and Budget, and the Controller
13 General. The Appeals Board shall approve the use of all unencumbered monies after that project is deemed
14 substantially complete. A project shall be deemed substantially complete when the project is occupied by
15 75 percent of the planned tenants or when deemed complete by the Appeals Board. One year after a project
16 is deemed substantially complete, any unencumbered authorization balance shall revert. In no case shall
17 this Section empower the Appeals Board to allow for the expenditure of funds for uses other than for the
18 funds authorized purpose(s). The Controller General shall notify the Co-Chairs of the Joint Legislative
19 Committee on the Capital Improvement Program of any decisions of the Appeals Board.

20 (b) The use of Minor Capital Improvement and Equipment funds in order to ensure completion of a
21 Major Capital Improvement project involving construction of a new facility is prohibited unless the use of
22 such funds are necessary due to a legal settlement or emergency or unforeseen conditions as determined by
23 the Director of the Office of Management and Budget, the Controller General and the Co-Chairs of the Joint
24 Legislative Committee on the Capital Improvement Program.

25 (c) A quarterly status report shall be submitted to the Controller General on all incomplete projects.

1 (d) No project's budget should be increased beyond what is appropriated in any Bond and Capital
2 Improvements Act, either with special funds or private funds, unless the use of those funds is approved by
3 the appropriate cabinet secretary, the Director of the Office of Management and Budget, the Controller
4 General and the Co-Chairs of the Joint Legislative Committee on the Capital Improvement Program.

5 Section 28. Construction Manager. It is the intent of the General Assembly that all public works
6 projects, including all public school projects, that utilize a construction manager on the project, utilize the
7 delivery methodology which requires the construction manager to secure a performance and payment bond
8 for their portion of the work. All subcontractors shall be listed at the start of the project and shall provide a
9 performance and payment bond which names the Construction Manager and the State of Delaware as
10 additional insureds. All provisions of 29 Del. C.c. 69 are in effect for projects which utilize Construction
11 Manager.

12 Section 29. Judicial Construction Oversight. It is the intent of the General Assembly that a nine-
13 member Executive Committee be created to oversee construction of new or major renovation of judicial
14 facilities. The Executive Committee shall include two members of the Legislature appointed by the Co-
15 Chairs of the Joint Legislative Committee on the Capital Improvement Program; the respective Chairs of
16 the House and Senate Judiciary Committees; two members of the Judiciary as appointed by the Chief
17 Justice; and three members of the Executive Department to include the Director of Facilities Management,
18 the Director of the Office of Management and Budget and their designee. The Executive Committee shall
19 work in conformation with existing construction oversight guidelines as written in Section 27 of this Act.

20 The Executive Committee is hereby empowered to:

21 (a) Select appropriate professionals necessary to program, site, design, construct, furnish and equip
22 the facility;

23 (b) Provide such oversight to ensure that the final facility provides optimal security and
24 incorporates maximum operational efficiencies both within the Judiciary and in conjunction with other
25 criminal justice agencies;

26 (c) Ensure that new construction and/or renovations are completed on schedule; and

1 (d) Ensure that the cost of new construction and/or renovations does not exceed the authorized
2 budget.

3 This section shall apply to the following projects: Kent County Courthouse/O'Brien Building;
4 Sussex County Family Court; Kent County Family Court and any Judicial construction or renovation
5 project requested by either the Judicial Branch or recommended by the Office of Management and Budget
6 for the Judicial Branch where the total project cost estimate exceeds \$10,000,000.

7 Section 30. Minor Capital Improvement and Equipment Supplement - Office of Management and
8 Budget. Notwithstanding the provisions of any other State law to the contrary, not more than five percent
9 of the total amount allocated to the Office of Management and Budget's MCI annual budget may be
10 expended to enter into contractual agreements for project representatives and associated administrative
11 support to ensure adequate oversight of State construction projects. The Director of the Office of
12 Management and Budget is directed to provide an itemized budget for this amount to the Controller General
13 by August 1, of each fiscal year, and expenditure reports to the Controller General by December 1 and June
14 1 of each fiscal year.

15 Section 31. New Castle County Courthouse. Notwithstanding any law or local government
16 ordinance, resolution, or any deed restrictions to the contrary, the Director of the Office of Management and
17 Budget shall designate the name of any state-owned or state-operated courthouse or other judicial building
18 or facility in New Castle County purchased, constructed, or improved by funds appropriated pursuant to an
19 Act of the General Assembly and shall have the sole authority to approve or disapprove the placement of
20 any statues or memorials in or on the grounds of such courthouse or judicial building or facility.

21 Section 32. Belvedere State Service Center Project. Notwithstanding any State laws to the
22 contrary, funds received from tenants in the Belvedere State Service Center shall be used by the Office of
23 Management and Budget for the maintenance and operation of the center.

24 Section 33. Kent County Courthouse Construction. It is the intent of the General Assembly that
25 the Office of Management and Budget shall have the authority to develop and implement procedures and a
26 methodology to engage a Construction Manager at Risk for all phases of the Kent County Courthouse

1 Project including the construction of any required parking facilities. To enable the engagement of a
2 Construction Manager at Risk, all provisions of 29 Del. C. c. 69 are hereby waived with the exception of §
3 6960 related to prevailing wage.

4 Section 34. Kent County Courthouse Appropriation. The Section 1 Addendum to this Act contains
5 an appropriation of \$2,000,000 which shall be used solely for the renovation of the existing Kent County
6 Courthouse.

7 Section 35. Sale of Surplus Property. Notwithstanding the provisions of any law to the contrary,
8 the Director of the Office of Management and Budget is authorized to solicit buyers, lessors or developers
9 and negotiate the sale, long or short-term lease, development or adaptation of the state-owned building and
10 parking lot, commonly known as the Bank of America Building and State Employee Workforce Education
11 and Training Center, located on the block bounded by French, 9th, 10th and Walnut Streets in Wilmington.
12 Net proceeds resulting from a sale, lease, development or reuse of the building and/or parking lot shall be
13 deposited to the General Fund. The Director of the Office of Management and Budget must receive
14 approval from the Co-Chairs of the Joint Legislative Committee on the Capital Improvement Program prior
15 to executing an agreement of sale, lease, development or use of the building or parking lot for other than
16 state agencies. The Director of the Office of Management and Budget is authorized to solicit buyers,
17 lessors, developers and others who may enable the sale, development, lease, or reuse of the property
18 directly, use public advertisement, auction, reverse auction, sealed bids, or issue requests for information
19 and requests for proposals. During Fiscal Year 2012, the Director of the Office of Management and Budget
20 may identify additional state-owned real property that, with the concurrence of the Co-Chairs of the Joint
21 Legislative Committee on the Capital Improvement Program and the Controller General, may be sold,
22 leased or developed pursuant to the provisions of this section.

23 Section 36. Capital Parking. It is the intent of the General Assembly that the Office of
24 Management and Budget may use funds previously appropriated for Capital Parking/Security in the Section
25 1 Addendum to 75 Del. Laws, c. 98 for the construction of the Kent County Courthouse and for the
26 development and construction of parking required by the City of Dover to obtain a Certificate of Occupancy

1 for the expanded Kent County Courthouse. The Office of Management and Budget may expand the scope
2 of the contract for the construction of the Kent County Courthouse to include all required parking and may
3 use design/build project delivery methodology to expedite completion of a parking structure, garage or
4 other means to provide the required number of new parking spaces. The Office of Management and Budget
5 shall evaluate all state-owned sites in and around the Capital Complex for the development of Courthouse-
6 related parking, and may also enter into an agreement with the City of Dover to construct the required
7 parking on city-owned land if that option is found to be advantageous to both the city and state, or may
8 purchase property, if necessary. All provisions of 29 Del. C. c. 69 are hereby waived, with the exception of
9 § 6960 related to prevailing wage rates, for construction of parking associated with the Kent County
10 Courthouse project.

11 Section 37. Card Access Security Systems. Notwithstanding the provisions of any law to the
12 contrary, the Office of Management and Budget, Department of Safety and Homeland Security, and the
13 Department of Technology and Information shall jointly develop and maintain specifications and standards
14 for card access security systems for all state facilities. Security system communications using state
15 infrastructure will observe enterprise standards and policies as defined by Department of Technology and
16 Information pursuant to 29 Del. C. c. 90. The specifications and standards shall enable a single-card
17 security solution for all state-owned facilities, require the ability for concurrent central and local
18 administration of card access functions, and shall include a registry of approved card readers and associated
19 hardware required to implement card access security systems. It is the intent of this section to authorize
20 Office of Management and Budget, Department of Safety and Homeland Security and Department of
21 Technology and Information to jointly select a single supplier, manufacturer or technology of access cards
22 and security management software for use by all state agencies. The Office of Management and Budget,
23 Department of Safety and Homeland Security and Department of Technology and Information shall
24 develop procedures and standards required for the evaluation and approval of agency requests for new or
25 modified security systems of any type. Before a state agency may install a new security system or modify

1 an existing system, the agency shall obtain the approval of the Office of Management and Budget,
2 Department of Safety and Homeland Security and Department of Technology and Information.

3 Section 38. Technology Fund. Of the funds appropriated to the Office of Management and Budget
4 in Fiscal Year 2006 (10-02-05-10004) for technology, \$900,000 is to be used for the development of a case
5 management system for the Office of the Attorney General and \$250,000 is to be used for City of
6 Wilmington security cameras.

7 Section 39. Appropriation of One-Time Special Funds. (a) A special fund of the State is created in
8 the Office of Management and Budget, Contingencies and One-Time Items (10-02-11) entitled “Building
9 Delaware’s Future Now Fund”. Notwithstanding the provisions of 29 Del. C. § 6102(a), for the fiscal year
10 ending June 30, 2012, the Secretary of Finance shall transfer actual receipts received under 12 Del. C. c. 11
11 that exceed \$40,000,000 to the Building Delaware’s Future Now Fund until such account reaches a balance
12 of \$115,000,000. When the account balance in the Building Delaware’s Future Now Fund reaches
13 \$115,000,000, any remaining receipts received by the State under 12 Del. C. c. 11 shall be deposited in the
14 General Fund.

15 (b) The Section 1 Addendum to this Act appropriates \$115,000,000 from the Building Delaware’s
16 Future Now Fund to be expended to make strategic investments that promote economic growth and job
17 creation in Delaware. To ensure that funds are available for projects identified in this subsection, the
18 transfer of funds from the Building Delaware’s Future Now Fund is subject to approval of the Director of
19 the Office of Management and Budget and the Controller General. For Fiscal Year 2012, as funds become
20 available, the following projects are to be funded:

21 1) New Jobs Infrastructure is to receive \$40,000,000 for renovation, construction or any other
22 type of improvements to roads, utilities and related infrastructure in order to attract new
23 businesses to Delaware, or for the expansion of existing Delaware businesses, when such an
24 economic development opportunity would create a significant number of direct, permanent,
25 quality, full-time jobs. Specific projects and amounts shall be approved by the Infrastructure
26 Investment Committee, composed of the Director of the Delaware Economic Development

Office, the Secretary of the Delaware Department of Transportation, the Co-Chairs of the Joint Committee on Capital Improvement and a member of the private sector who shall be appointed by the Governor. The State hereby authorizes the issuance of bonds, to which the state shall pledge its full faith and credit, such bonds to be issued in such principal amount as necessary to provide proceeds to the State in the amount of \$15,000,000. Bonds authorized to be used by this subsection shall mature not later than 20 years from their date of issuance in which the date of issuance shall be no earlier than the approval of the transfer of funds from New Jobs Infrastructure to specific projects.

- 2) Asset Preservation is to receive \$35,000,000 to be expended on investments in capital improvements and the maintenance and restoration of state owned property. For Fiscal Year 2012, as funds become available, the following projects are to be funded:

9 3) The Housing Development Fund - Affordable Rental Housing Program of the Delaware State
10 Housing Authority (10-08-01) is to receive \$10,000,000 to be used to leverage other funding
11 sources, such as Low Income Housing Tax Credits and tax-exempt bonds to help create
12 and/or improve affordable rental housing stocks in Delaware. This investment in affordable
13 rental housing will increase economic activity in the State of Delaware. The Director of the
14 Delaware State Housing Authority shall report to the Director of the Office of Management
15 and Budget and the Controller General no later than April 30th on the expenditures of the
16 Housing Development Fund - Affordable Rental Housing. Said report shall also include the
17 amount and expenditure of any non-state funds received by the State for said affordable
18 rental housing projects.

19 4) Delaware's institutions of higher education are to receive \$10,000,000 each. As funds
20 become available, the following projects are to be funded:

7 Section 40. Employing Delawareans Reporting Requirement. The Section 1 Addendum to this Act
8 makes the following appropriations from “One-Time Special Funds;” \$10,000,000 to the University of
9 Delaware; \$10,000,000 to Delaware State University; \$10,000,000 to Delaware Technical and Community
10 College; \$10,000,000 to the Delaware State Housing Authority; \$55,000,000 to New Jobs Infrastructure;
11 and \$35,000,000 in Asset Preservation. Expenditure of said funds shall be subject to the following
12 provisions:

13 (a) Any public works or professional services contract (1) to which any agency, the University of
14 Delaware, Delaware State University, or Delaware Technical and Community College is a party; (2) for
15 which payment shall be funded in whole or in part by monies hereunder; and (3) for which the probable cost
16 is greater than the amount set by the Contracting and Purchasing Advisory Council pursuant to 29 Del. C.
17 § 6913.

18 (b) No bid for any contract hereunder shall be responsive unless the prospective bidder discloses its
19 reasonable, good-faith determination of (1) the number of employees reasonably anticipated to be employed
20 on the project; (2) the number and percentage of such employees who are bona fide legal residents of the
21 State; (3) the total number of employees of the bidder; and (4) the total percentage of employees of such
22 bidder who are bona fide residents of the State. To the extent subcontractors are to be employed in
23 connection herewith, the bidder shall further disclose its reasonable, good-faith determination of the number
24 and percentage of employees of such subcontractor who are bona fide legal residents of the State.

25 (c) All contractors awarded contracts hereunder shall submit a report to the Director of the Office
26 of Management and Budget setting forth the actual number and percentage of employees of such contractor

1 who are bona fide legal residents of the State. To the extent subcontractors are employed in connection
2 with any such contractor, the contractor shall further disclose the actual number and percentage of
3 employees of such subcontractor who are bona fide legal residents of the State. Such report shall be due on
4 the earlier of 30 days from the completion of the project or December 31 of each calendar year.

5 (d) For purposes of this section, “bona fide legal resident of this State” shall mean any resident
6 who has established residence of at least 90 days in the State.

7 (e) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary herein, this section shall not apply to any contract for
8 which any exception would apply pursuant to 29 Del. C. § 6904. Without limitation of the foregoing, if any
9 provision of this section conflicts or is inconsistent with any statute, rule or regulation of the federal
10 government applicable to a project or activity, the cost of which is to be paid or reimbursed in whole or in
11 part by the federal government, and due to such conflict or inconsistency the availability of federal funds
12 may be jeopardized, such provision shall not apply to such project or activity. Further, if any provisions of
13 this section conflict or are inconsistent with 31 Del. C. c. 40, the provisions of 31 Del. C. c. 40 shall prevail
14 and govern.

15 Section 41. Acquisition of Old Dover Public Library. Notwithstanding any laws to the contrary,
16 the Director of the Office of Management and Budget is authorized to negotiate with representatives of the
17 City of Dover for the acquisition of the old Dover Public Library located at 45 South State Street. The
18 purpose of said acquisition is to accommodate a consolidation of DNREC office space and facilitate the
19 creation of a walkable campus near downtown Dover. The value of this acquisition shall not exceed the fair
20 market value of the property. If negotiation is successful, actual possession of the old Dover Public Library
21 by the State is to take place after the new Dover Public Library opens and funds are authorized by the
22 General Assembly.

1 **DELAWARE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT OFFICE**

2 Section 42. Composites Research. The Delaware Economic Development Office (DEDO) is
3 authorized to provide a match of up to \$100,000 to the University of Delaware Center for Composite
4 Materials for federal research grants received that support the development and application of composite
5 manufacturing technology for the benefit of Delaware companies. Such match shall be disbursed from the
6 Strategic Fund upon documentation of the receipt of federal funds allocated to the Center during the fiscal
7 year for these purposes and upon documentation of the relevance of these research projects to Delaware
8 industries' needs and their participation within said projects.

9 Section 43. Delaware Industrial Park. DEDO is hereby prohibited from locating any operation that
10 involves the use of hazardous materials at the former Helix Synthesis Technologies site within the
11 Delaware Industrial Park. Hazardous materials are defined as any material of a gaseous, liquid or solid
12 form that has the potential to cause temporary or permanent harm to humans or the environment.

13 Section 44. Diamond State Port Corporation. The Section 1 Addendum to this Act appropriates
14 \$10,000,000 to the Diamond State Port Corporation (DSPC). No funds may be expended from this
15 appropriation without the approval of the Board of Directors of the Port Corporation. Any funds remaining
16 unspent or unencumbered as of June 30, 2012 shall revert to the General Fund and Bond Reversion
17 Account. In addition, the DSPC may borrow, on an interest-free basis, \$2,000,000 of this authorization to
18 meet its short term operating expenses during Fiscal Year 2012.

19 Section 45. Kalmar Nyckel. The scheduling of the Kalmar Nyckel by non-state entities shall
20 require the approval of the Riverfront Development Corporation. Further, the Riverfront Development
21 Corporation is encouraged to enter into negotiations with interested parties to review the disposition of
22 loans to the Kalmar Nyckel.

23 Section 46. Transportation Property Disposition. The proceeds from the future sale of parcels of
24 land the Department of Transportation acquired on Beech Street in the City of Wilmington and Delmarva
25 Properties located in the Wilmington Riverfront area shall be deposited to the Transportation Trust Fund.

1 Section 47. Council on Development Finance. If DEDO makes an award not in agreement with
2 the recommendations of the Council on Development Finance, the Director of DEDO shall notify the Co-
3 Chairs of the Joint Legislative Committee on Capital Improvements within 10 business days. The
4 notification shall include details of the actual award, the Council recommendations on the proposal, and a
5 justification for why DEDO did not follow the recommendations of the Council.

6 Section 48. New Markets Tax Credit Program. In the event that the Director of DEDO or the
7 Director of the Delaware State Housing Authority and the Secretary of Finance determine that it is
8 advisable to apply for participation in the New Markets Tax Credit Program under the U.S. Treasury
9 Department, the Director is authorized to form a business entity or organization to apply for and manage
10 this program on behalf of the State, as required by applicable federal legislation and regulations. Any such
11 application for said program shall be subject to the approval of the Co-Chairs of the Joint Legislative
12 Committee on the Capital Improvement Program and the Delaware State Clearinghouse Committee.
13 Should such application receive final approval by the U.S. Treasury Department or other federal
14 governmental entity charged with such authority, at least one public hearing shall be held for the purpose of
15 presenting the program, the availability of financial assistance and the selection process and the Director of
16 the Delaware State Housing Authority shall notify, by certified and regular mail, any state senators and
17 representatives in whose districts any development project may be located, upon the submission of a request
18 for financing and a decision to provide financing for such development pursuant to the New Market Tax
19 Credit Program. In addition, the Housing Director shall so notify the Chief Executive Office of any local
20 government in whose jurisdiction any development will be located.

21 Section 49. Fraunhofer Vaccine Development. The Section 1 Addendum to this Act appropriates
22 \$1,000,000 for Fraunhofer Vaccine Development. It is the intent of the General Assembly and the
23 Administration that said funds represent the first year of a six-year commitment by the State of Delaware
24 to leverage a 2:1 matching grant of \$18,000,000 from Fraunhofer USA.

25 Section 50. Emerging Technology Center. Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, funds
26 appropriated to DEDO for the Emerging Technology Center, pursuant to 74 Del. Laws, c. 308 § 36(c),

1 shall be expended by DEDO for the purpose of operating the Delaware Emerging Technology Center
2 (“ETC”). Operating expenses may include, but are not limited to ETC software licensing agreements;
3 patent maintenance fees; Delaware sponsored ETC investor forums, businesses plan competitions and
4 conferences, marketing campaigns; and Intellectual Property Business Creation program implementation
5 initiatives.

6 Section 51. Riverfront Development Corporation. (a) Funds appropriated for the Riverfront
7 Development Corporation of Delaware (RDC) shall be disbursed to a special fund to be known as the
8 Riverfront Development Corporation Fund hereinafter referred to as the Fund.

9 (b) The Fund shall be invested by the State Treasurer in securities consistent with the policies
10 established by the Cash Management Policy Board. All monies generated by the Fund shall be deposited
11 in the Fund.

12 (c) Funds appropriated to DEDO for RDC shall be expended only with the approval of the board
13 of directors of the RDC. Funds may only be expended for activities related to the redevelopment of the
14 Brandywine and Christina riverfront areas, including: planning and design studies; the acquisition,
15 construction and improvement of real property; environmental remediation; costs of operations and
16 administration; conversion of the Chase Center on the Riverfront to a conference center; debt service; and
17 other expenses in furtherance of the mission of the RDC.

18 Section 52. Limited Investment for Financial Traction (LIFT) Initiative. Notwithstanding any
19 other law to the contrary, DEDO is hereby authorized to pay administrative fees associated with the LIFT
20 Initiative from the Strategic Fund not to exceed two percent of the program total.

21 Section 53. Delaware Stadium Corporation. Contingent upon a renewed lease agreement between
22 the Wilmington Blue Rocks and the Delaware Stadium Corporation, the Section 1 Addendum to this Act
23 appropriates \$450,000 to the Delaware Economic Development Office for the purpose of renovating certain
24 offices in Frawley Stadium.

1 **DELAWARE STATE HOUSING AUTHORITY**

2 Section 54. Housing Development Fund - Affordable Rental Housing Program. The Section 1
3 Addendum to this Act appropriates \$14,000,000 for Housing Development Fund - Affordable Rental
4 Housing Program (10-08-01). It is the intent of the General Assembly and the Administration that said
5 funds are to be used to leverage other funding sources, such as Low Income Housing Tax Credits and tax-
6 exempt bonds to help create and/or improve affordable rental housing stocks in Delaware. This investment
7 in affordable rental housing will increase economic activity in the State of Delaware. The Director of the
8 Delaware State Housing Authority shall report to the Controller General and the Director of the Office of
9 Management and Budget no later than April 30, 2012 on the expenditure of the Housing Development Fund
10 appropriated in Section 1 Addendum to this Act. Said report shall also include the amount and expenditure
11 of any non-state funds received by the State for said affordable rental housing projects.

12 Section 55. Delaware State Rental Assistance Program. The Section 1 Addendum to this Act
13 appropriates \$1,500,000 for Housing Development Fund - Delaware State Rental Assistance Program.
14 These funds shall be administered by the Delaware State Housing Authority to provide rental housing
15 vouchers to program participants referred by Department of Health and Social Services (DHSS) and
16 Department of Services for Children, Youth and Their Families (DSCYF) with a need for community-based
17 supportive services. The Director of the Delaware State Housing Authority shall report to the Director of
18 the Office of Management and Budget and the Controller General no later than November 15 and March 15
19 on the expenditure of the Housing Development Fund - Delaware State Rental Assistance Program and
20 include any cost saving achieved by DHSS and DSCYF as a result of a reduction in demand on state
21 institutions.

1 **DEPARTMENT OF TECHNOLOGY AND INFORMATION**

2 Section 56. Data Center Projects. In no instance shall any information technology data center
3 project be initiated by a department/agency during this fiscal year until a formalized plan has been approved
4 by the department/agency head, Director of the Office of Management and Budget and the State Chief
5 Information Officer. This includes, but is not limited to, relocating, renovating and/or constructing new
6 information technology data centers.

1 **DEPARTMENT OF STATE**

2 Section 57. North Wilmington Library. Funds authorized in the Section 1 Addendum of 70 Del.
3 Laws, c. 210 shall be used to plan and construct a library within the First Senate District.

4 Section 58. Delaware River Main Channel Dredging. It is the intent of the General Assembly that
5 any future appropriation of State funds for the main channel dredging of the Delaware River shall be
6 contingent upon the following:

7 1) A written agreement between the Army Corps of Engineers and the Department of Natural
8 Resources and Environmental Control (DNREC) dealing with the potential use of dredge spoils
9 for Delaware beach preservation and habitat protection.

10 2) The Corps of Engineers shall meet all necessary DNREC permitting requirements.

11 Section 59. Museum Maintenance. The Section 1 Addendum to this Act appropriates \$350,000 to
12 the Department of State for museum maintenance. It is the intent of the General Assembly that these funds
13 be retained by the Department of State, Division of Historical and Cultural Affairs for use with the
14 operations of State museums or for repairs to those facilities under the control of the Division of Historical
15 and Cultural Affairs.

16 Section 60. Library Construction. Proposals submitted by the Department of State to the Office of
17 Management and Budget under 29 Del. C. § 6604A shall include a statement as to whether or not each of
18 the libraries have the required 50 percent non-state share match as defined in 29 Del. C. § 6602A(2).

19 Section 61. Retroactivity. Amend 29 Del. C. c. 66A, by adding new section 6606A entitled
20 “Retroactivity” whereby “Any library construction project certified by the Delaware Division of Libraries
21 and the Delaware Council on Libraries may proceed with planning, design and other construction
22 expenditures using local funds and any state assistance may be applied retroactively to such costs incurred
23 after the date of such certification, provided however, that certification of such project shall not bind the
24 state to provide assistance.”.

25 Section 62. Stabilization Endowment for the Arts. It is the intent of the General Assembly that
26 previously appropriated funds from the Department of State to the Stabilization Endowment for the Arts

- 1 may be used to fund operating expenses pursuant to appropriate controls and procedures adopted by the
- 2 Board of the Arts Consortium of Delaware and upon concurrence of the Division of Arts.

1 **DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE**

2 Section 63. Bond Proceeds Reimbursement. Unless not permitted by the Internal Revenue Code of
3 1986, as amended (the “Code”), whenever the General Assembly authorizes the issuance of the State’s
4 General Obligation bonds or the Delaware Transportation Authority’s (the Authority) revenue bonds to
5 finance the costs of specific capital projects, it is the intent of the General Assembly that the interest on
6 such bonds shall not be included in gross income for federal income tax purposes under Section 103 of the
7 Code, and the United States Treasury Regulations (the “Regulations”) thereunder as they may be
8 promulgated from time to time, or shall be qualified as Build America Bonds pursuant to the Code and the
9 Regulations. Pursuant to the State's budget and financial policies, other than unexpected situations where
10 surplus revenues render bond financing unnecessary or undesirable, no funds other than the proceeds of
11 such bonds, are or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set
12 aside by the State to pay the costs of such specific capital projects. Pursuant to the Authority’s budget and
13 financial policies, it is expected that approximately 50 percent of the costs of its capital projects shall be
14 funded on a long-term basis from the proceeds of such bonds. However, after the authorization of such
15 bonds but prior to their issuance, non-bond funds from the State’s General Fund or the Authority’s
16 Transportation Trust fund or other funds may be advanced on a temporary basis to pay a portion of the costs
17 of such specific capital projects. In that event, it is expected that these non-bond funds will be reimbursed
18 from the proceeds of such bonds when they are issued. This reimbursement may cause a portion of such
19 bonds to become reimbursement bonds within the meaning of Section 1.150-2 of the Regulations. Under
20 those Regulations, to preserve the exclusion of the interest on such bonds from gross income for federal
21 income tax purposes, it may be necessary to make a declaration of official intent. The Secretary of Finance
22 is hereby designated as the appropriate representative of the State and the Secretary of Transportation is
23 hereby designated as the appropriate representative of the Authority, and each is authorized to declare
24 official intent on behalf of the State or the Authority, as the case may be, within the meaning of Section
25 1.150-2 of the Regulations, whenever and to the extent that such declaration is required to preserve such tax
26 treatment.

1 Section 64. Qualified Zone Academy Bonds. A portion of the General Obligation bonds
2 authorized under this Act for a school construction project may be issued in the form of Qualified Zone
3 Academy Bonds (QZABs) within the meaning of the Code and the Regulations. Such portion shall be
4 equal to the maximum amount of QZABs which may be issued under the Code and the Regulations. The
5 Secretary of Finance is hereby authorized to determine the terms and conditions of the QZABs and the
6 eligible public school project financed by the QZABs, and the manner by which QZABs shall be awarded
7 to the purchasers thereof, including private negotiated sale, notwithstanding anything to the contrary
8 contained in 29 Del. C. c. 74; provided that the requirements of 29 Del. C. § 7422 must be observed.

9 Section 65. Qualified School Construction Bonds; Build America Bonds; and Amortization
10 Requirements. A portion of the General Obligation bonds authorized under this Act or any previous
11 authorization act may be issued in the form of Qualified School Construction Bonds (QSCBs), Build
12 America Bonds (BABs), or any other bonds permitted by the federal American Recovery and Reinvestment
13 Act of 2009 (ARRA) or by the Code. The QSCBs may be issued in a principal amount not exceeding the
14 maximum amount of QSCBs which may be issued under the Code and the Regulations and are hereby
15 authorized as part of the General Obligation bonds authorized under 29 Del. C. § 7422(b). Notwithstanding
16 anything to the contrary contained in 29 Del. C. 74, the Secretary of Finance is hereby authorized to
17 determine the terms and conditions of the QSCBs, the BABs and any other bonds permitted by ARRA, or
18 any bonds issued in connection with the QSCBs or BABs, and the manner by which they shall be awarded
19 to the purchasers thereof, including private negotiated sale. Any bonds authorized in this Act or any
20 previous authorization act may be issued during Fiscal Year 2012 or Fiscal Year 2013, and may be subject
21 to any amortization requirements as shall be determined by the issuing officers notwithstanding anything to
22 the contrary contained in Section 7406(b) of Title 29.

23 Section 66. Research and Development. Amend 30 Del. C. § 2073(a) by striking the date
24 “December 31, 2011” as it appears therein and inserting in lieu thereof the date “December 31, 2012”.

25 Section 67. Blue Collar. Amend 78 Del. Laws, c. 47, §10 by striking the phrase “and by
26 redesignating subsection (l) as subsection (k)”.

1 Section 68. Lotteries. Amend 29 Del. C. §4803 (s) by adding the word “keno” after the word
2 roulette and before the words “bingo, wheel fortune”.

1 **DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES**

2 Section 69. Delaware Health Information Network. a) The Section 1 Addendum to this Act
3 appropriates \$2,996,900 for the Delaware Health Information Network (DHIN), a joint initiative between
4 private, federal and state funds. The \$2,996,900 shall be utilized to support the development of an
5 interoperable network to exchange clinical information among all healthcare providers across the state to
6 improve patient outcomes and patient-provider relationships. The system shall be designed to allow patient
7 clinical information to be shared across all healthcare facilities and organizations and across public and
8 private sectors. The DHIN, shall provide the following to the Director of the Office of Management and
9 Budget, the Secretary of the Department of Health and Social Services and the Controller General:

10 (1) A budget that outlines the expenditure for the \$2,771,300 of the state appropriation including a
11 breakdown of categories (personnel/contractual services/supplies, etc.); and

12 (2) A total project budget over multiple years that includes funding allocations detailing federal,
13 private and state requested amounts.

14 b) Expenditures of the remaining \$225,600 of state funds shall be used only for the purpose of
15 matching the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) Health Information Exchange (HIE) grant
16 funds, and shall be authorized by the Secretary of the Department of Health and Social Services.

17 Remaining funds of this amount may not be applied towards any purpose other than ARRA HIE grant
18 matching. Working with state agencies, DHIN shall work to identify match requirements for the ARRA
19 HIE grant for Fiscal Year 2013 and Fiscal Year 2014 from non-federal in-kind sources, and not limited to
20 non-federal cash contributions.

21 c) Of the funds outlined in subsection a) of this section, \$1,000,000 shall be withheld and may be
22 expended only upon approval of the Co-Chairs of the Joint Legislative Committee on the Capital
23 Improvement Program. Such approval shall be contingent upon acceptance of DHIN's September 2011
24 business plan outlining DHIN's timeframe in achieving and ability to become fiscally self-sustaining.

25 Section 70. Stockley Center Building Lease. Notwithstanding the provisions of 29 Del. C. c. 94 or
26 any state law to the contrary, it is the intent of the General Assembly that the Department of Health and

- 1 Social Services shall enter into lease negotiations with representatives from the Delaware Adolescent
- 2 Program Incorporated (DAPI). The purpose of these negotiations will be to secure currently vacant space
- 3 on the Stockley Campus for use by DAPI.

1 **DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION**

2 Section 71. Prison Construction. (a) The Director of the Office of Management and Budget, as
3 provided through construction management services, shall consult with the Commissioner of Correction to
4 ensure expedient programming, planning and construction of authorized correctional facilities. None of
5 the funds authorized herein or in prior fiscal years are intended to supplant federal funds.

6 (b) Use of any federal grant funds awarded and approved by the Delaware State Clearinghouse
7 Committee for the purpose of constructing correctional facilities shall have the technical oversight of the
8 Director of the Office of Management and Budget as defined in the appropriate Section of this Act
9 pertaining to management of the construction to ensure proper use and timely completion of all such
10 construction projects authorized herein.

11 Section 72. Community Restoration. The Department of Correction may, to the extent resources
12 and appropriately classified offenders are available, direct these offenders to assist with community
13 restoration projects. These projects may include beautification, clean up and restoration efforts requested
14 by civic, governmental and fraternal organizations approved by the Commissioner.

15 Section 73. Maintenance and Restoration. The Section 1 Addendum to this Act appropriates
16 \$3,135,400 to the Department of Correction for Maintenance and Restoration projects. The Department
17 must submit a bi-annual report to the Director of the Office of Management and Budget and the Controller
18 General, detailing the expenditure of such funds and the respective projects. The Department shall submit a
19 preliminary plan to the Director of the Office of Management and Budget and Controller General for
20 maintenance projects for the following fiscal year by October 31.

1 **DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES AND ENVIRONMENTAL CONTROL**

2 Section 74. Conservation Cost-Sharing Program. The Section 1 Addendum to this Act
3 appropriates \$1,500,000 to the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control for the
4 Conservation Cost-Sharing Program. Of this amount, 70 percent will be divided equally among the three
5 conservation districts to expand their water quality and water management programs. Preference should
6 be given to projects or conservation practices that improve water quality on lands covered by nutrient
7 management plans, as practicable and in consultation with the Secretary. The remaining balance will be
8 directed towards nutrient management and water quality efforts statewide as determined by the Secretary,
9 in consultation with the three conservation districts.

10 Section 75. DNREC Land Acquisition. Except for land acquired by approval of the Open Space
11 Council or approved through a Bond and Capital Improvements Act, land shall not be purchased by the
12 Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control without prior approval of the Co-Chairs of
13 the Joint Legislative Committee on the Capital Improvement Program provided, however, that the
14 Department is not prohibited from conducting studies, surveys or other contractual arrangements that
15 would normally precede land acquisition procedures.

16 Section 76. Open Space Match Requirements. Notwithstanding the provisions of 29 Del. C.
17 § 6102A(c)(2), upon written request by the Open Space Council and notification of the Secretary of
18 Finance, the Co-Chairs of the Joint Legislative Committee on Capital Improvements are hereby
19 empowered to waive on a case-by-case basis the match requirements for a specific Open Space land
20 purchase if it can be demonstrated that meeting said match requirements would prevent the timely
21 purchase of said parcel.

22 Section 77. Army Corps of Engineers Project Cooperation Agreements. By using funds approved
23 by Bond and Capital Improvements Acts, the Secretary of DNREC is authorized to sign Project
24 Cooperation Agreements with the Department of the Army and other appropriate sponsors for planning,
25 construction, operation and maintenance for projects entered into by said Agreements.

1 Section 78. Indian River Marina. In accordance with the provisions of 73 Del. Laws, c. 350, § 70,
2 DNREC under the direction of the Director of the Office of Management and Budget may utilize up to
3 \$9,900,000 in funds from the Twenty-First Century Fund for the Parks Endowment Account as established
4 in 29 Del. C. § 6102A(e), for the purpose of revitalizing and enhancing public amenities within the
5 Delaware Seashore State Park in and around the Indian River Marina Complex and related support facilities
6 as presented to the Joint Legislative Committee on Capital Improvements on May 15, 2002. DNREC will
7 repay both the principal borrowed and interest on the principal borrowed equal to that interest lost as a
8 result of borrowing from the Account. Repayment shall not exceed twenty years.

9 Section 79. Newark Reservoir. Of the funds allocated from the Twenty-First Century
10 Water/Wastewater Management Account in 72 Del. Laws, c. 258 and c. 489, \$3,400,000 has been set aside
11 for the Newark Reservoir Project. If the City of Newark annexes the property referred to as New Castle
12 County Tax Parcel #08-059.20-002, the City must repay to the State those monies appropriated in the Fiscal
13 Year 2000 and 2001 Bond and Capital Improvements Acts for said project.

14 Section 80. Seventh Street Marina. It is the intent of the General Assembly to classify the Seventh
15 Street Marina, located on East Seventh Street, being Tax Parcel # 26.044.00.0013 containing 7.86 acres of
16 land (of which 5.27 acres, more or less, is above the high water line) as existing marina for purposes of the
17 State of Delaware Marina Regulations, adopted on March 29, 1990 and amended on February 22, 1993.
18 Such classification does not exempt any person seeking to make physical improvements to the marina from
19 permit application fees pursuant to 7 Del. C. c. 66 and c. 72.

20 Section 81. Waterway Management. DNREC is directed to provide dedicated, comprehensive
21 waterway management for state waters. DNREC will: maintain design depths and mark navigational
22 channels of the State that are not maintained and marked by any entity of the federal government; remove
23 nuisance macroalgae; remove abandoned vessels; remove derelict structures, trees and other debris that
24 threatens safe navigation; and perform any other waterway management services that may be identified to
25 preserve, maintain and enhance recreational use of the State's tidal waters, as well as improve
26 environmental conditions as warranted or directed by the Governor or Secretary of DNREC. DNREC is

1 further directed to undertake a study of the sediment sources and patterns of sediment movement that results
2 in deposition within State waterways to determine if there are methods to reduce the dependency on
3 dredging to remove deposited sediments.

4 Section 82. Clean Water Funding Leverage. The Department of Natural Resources and
5 Environmental Control, under advisement from the Clean Water Advisory Council, is encouraged to
6 evaluate the potential leveraging of the Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund and/or the Twenty-First
7 Century Fund Wastewater Management Account based on the recommendation of the Dialogue on
8 Financing Wastewater and Stormwater Infrastructure report sponsored by the Delaware Public Policy
9 Institute, Office of the Governor, Office of the Lieutenant Governor, DNREC and the Clean Water
10 Advisory Council. The Department is further encouraged to include in its evaluation the use of any other
11 resources or assets within the Department that can be used to create an environmental infrastructure trust to
12 further the environmental goals of the State.

13 Section 83. Conservation Districts. It is the intent of the General Assembly that the Office of
14 Natural Resources, Division of Watershed Stewardship and the Conservation District as established by 7
15 Del. C. c. 39 shall have the authority to transfer Twenty-First Century Funds among projects that are
16 located within their respective districts. Projects into which funds are transferred shall have their full non-
17 Twenty-First Century funding in place before any such transfer can occur and in no case shall any project
18 from which funds are taken be dropped from the project list for construction when funds become available.
19 The Office of Natural Resources, Division of Watershed Stewardship shall report a list of completed
20 transfers to the Director of the Office of Management and Budget and the Controller General on December
21 15, 2011 and May 15, 2012.

22 Section 84. Yard Waste Drop Sites. It is the intent of the General Assembly that all yard waste
23 drops sites in New Castle County remain operational unless otherwise directed by the General Assembly.

24 Section 85. Drainage Project Match Requirements. For water management and drainage projects
25 undertaken by the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control's, Office of Natural
26 Resources, Division of Watershed Stewardship and the Conservation Districts using 21st Century Fund

1 Resource, Conservation and Development funds, the required non-21st Century Fund match shall be
2 reduced from 25 percent to a minimum of 10 percent of the total project cost for any project undertaken
3 during Fiscal Year 2012 and 2013. With the agreement of the legislators in whose districts the projects
4 originated, 21st Century funding may be transferred among projects in an effort to accumulate up to 90
5 percent 21st Century funding for priority projects. If the construction of these projects extends beyond
6 Fiscal Year 2013, so long as the project has expended funds during this period for planning, survey, design,
7 engineering, permitting or other support functions, the match percentage shall remain 10 percent for the
8 project's duration.

9 Section 86. Auburn Valley Project. The implementation of the transportation, stormwater
10 management, demolition, remediation, redevelopment, and parks and recreation element of the Auburn
11 Valley Master Plan shall not be subject to the zoning, subdivision, land use, or building code ordinances or
12 regulations of New Castle County.

13 Section 87. Conservation District Contracting. Notwithstanding any statutory provision or
14 regulation to the contrary, it is the intent of the General Assembly that the Department of Natural Resources
15 and Environmental Control may enlist Delaware's conservation districts as provided in 7 Del. C. c. 39 to
16 advance the purposes of this chapter. All contracts shall be subject to the provisions of 29 Del. C. § 6960.

17 Section 88. Recycling Cash Flow. The Department is hereby authorized, consistent with 7 Del.
18 C. c. 60 and c. 30 Del. C. c. 29, to issue grants and loans to assist persons engaged in the business of
19 collecting, transporting, processing, or marketing recyclable materials. To that end, the Secretary shall be
20 authorized to borrow up to \$22,000,000 in combination from the Delaware Land and Water Conservation
21 Trust Fund Endowment Account, the Parks Endowment Account, the Beach Preservation Appropriation
22 Account and the Resource, Conservation and Development Appropriation in order to fund activities
23 pursuant to 7 Del. C. § 6054 and § 6055. Any funds borrowed from such accounts shall be paid back in
24 full by no later than June 30, 2015, from fees generated pursuant to 30 Del. C. c. 29. To the extent that
25 borrowing results in reduced revenues to the Department for programs that rely on interest from these
26 accounts, principal from the account may be used to offset up to the amount of lost interest revenue and

1 shall be repaid by fees generated pursuant to 30 Del. C. c. 29. A report must be submitted regarding funds
2 borrowed and update on the recycling program to the Director of Office and Management and Budget and
3 the Controller General's Office by October 15, 2011 and April 15, 2012.

4 Section 89. Bay View. In accordance with the provisions of 77 Del. Laws c. 329 § 90, the
5 Department is hereby authorized to spend up to \$200,000 in prior year funds from the Beach Management
6 Account for the purpose of stabilization and/or restoration of the beach at the community of Bay View. No
7 new appropriations shall be made for this purpose. These funds shall be used for the acquisition of
8 additional scientific data, and/or preparation of local, state, and federal permit applications for this project
9 and may be added to subsequent year appropriations for construction of this protective beach and terminal
10 structure to assist in stabilizing the beach. Project oversight and implementation will be provided through
11 the New Castle Conservation District. Prior to any construction, all applicable local, state and federal
12 permitting requirements shall be met. The Department's interim policy for Coastal Lands Restoration
13 Projects shall apply and prior to commencement of any construction, a written agreement between the
14 Department and the community shall be signed by appropriate parties and will address applicable policy
15 considerations. Any funds borrowed from the Beach Management Account shall be restored through Bond
16 Bill appropriations no later than August 1, 2015.

17 Section 90. Redevelopment of Strategic Sites. The Section 1 Addendum to this Act appropriates
18 \$2,500,000 to the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control for the redevelopment of
19 strategic sites.

20 (a) \$2,250,000 shall be used for the remediation and redevelopment of the former NVF Facility in
21 Yorklyn, along the Red Clay Creek.

22 (b) \$250,000 shall be used to develop a plan for the redesign and redevelopment of the Fort
23 DuPont complex in Delaware City that encourages economic development that is compatible with current
24 historic structures and recreational purposes. The Department of Natural Resources and Environmental
25 Control shall work with the Delaware Economic Development Office, the Delaware State Housing

1 Authority and the Department of Transportation to submit a joint plan for the development of these sites to
2 the Director of the Office of Management and Budget and the Controller General by October 15, 2011.

3 Section 91. University of Delaware – Lewes Lands. The Department of Natural Resources and
4 Environmental Control (Department) has identified a small portion of land previously acquired from the
5 University by the Department that may be appropriate to be transferred to the University. The land is
6 located adjacent to the Sharp Campus in Lewes and under easement for use by the University. The land is
7 limited to the area on which the University is conducting research associated with the operation of a wind
8 turbine and will be of sufficient size to ensure the proper safety fall zones for the existing wind turbine. The
9 Department has determined that this land is now not essential to the Department’s needs. In accordance
10 with 30 Del. C. §5423 (c)(2), the General Assembly authorizes the Secretary of the Department to negotiate
11 a transfer of such land to the University in keeping with the requirements of this section. The Secretary may
12 accept funds or, if he determines that it is in the best interests of the Department, may accept open space
13 property or property rights in exchange, or a combination of funds and property or property rights, as long
14 as the total funds and fair market value of the exchanged property at least equals the fair market value of the
15 Lewes land. Any land/fund transfers pursuant to this section, shall require the approval of the Co-Chairs of
16 the Joint Legislative Committee on the Capital Improvement Program, the Director of the Office of
17 Management and Budget and the Controller General. Prior to seeking such approval and formally
18 concluding any agreement, the Department shall bring any proposal to the Open Space Council for
19 consideration. Any agreement shall include conditions on the use of the parcel such that no additional land-
20 based wind turbines shall be constructed.

21 Section 92. Buried Debris Remediation Program. Funding for the remediation of buried debris
22 will follow the priority list established by date of application to DNREC for assistance. If, in the opinion of
23 the Secretary of DNREC, a site represents an emergency, that site can be given a special priority and
24 remediated as quickly as practicable. The \$600,000 appropriation for Fiscal Year 2012 shall be added to
25 existing appropriations. Funds shall be available through the New Castle Conservation District for cost-
26 share assistance to landowners with buried debris on their properties. To be eligible for cost-share, the site

1 must be listed on the DNREC priority list and meet the DNREC established criteria for buried debris
2 removal. For projects that cost up to \$40,000, the landowner must provide twenty-five percent of the cost
3 of remediation including disposal costs. For projects that cost more than \$40,000, the landowner must
4 provide \$10,000 plus 10% of the cost in excess of \$40,000, including disposal costs. The provisions of this
5 Program shall commence with those projects entitled "FY 2005 New Projects" as contained in the approved
6 Fiscal Year 2005 Resource, Conservation and Development Projects list. The homeowner match may be
7 provided by the homeowner, the County, the local civic or maintenance association or any combination
8 thereof.

9 Section 93. Tax Ditches. When a tax ditch traverses county lines, and said ditch has a project
10 added to the 21st Century Fund Resource, Conservation and Development Project List by one county
11 Conservation District, it shall automatically be added to the Project list in the other county by that county
12 Conservation District.

1 **DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION**

2 Section 94. General Provisions. The Department of Transportation (Department) is hereby
3 authorized and directed to use all its designated powers and resources to carry out the following legislative
4 mandates:

5 (a) Transportation Trust Fund Authorizations. Sums not to exceed \$432,624,900 (State:
6 \$219,488,000; Federal: \$203,347,300; Other: \$9,789,600) are authorized to be withdrawn from the
7 Transportation Trust Fund to carry out the projects and programs as set forth in the Section 1 Addendum of
8 this Act.

9 (b) New Transportation Trust Fund Debt Authorizations. To fund a portion of the projects
10 authorized herein, the Delaware Transportation Authority is hereby authorized to issue bonds in an amount
11 not to exceed \$138,929,253 pursuant to the provisions of 2 Del. C. c. 13 and 14, of which not more than
12 \$129,882,000 plus premium shall be used for purposes set forth in the Section 1 Addendum of this Act with
13 the remainder, not to exceed \$9,047,253 to be used to fund issuance costs and necessary reserves for the
14 Reserve Account.

15 Section 95. Maintenance and Operations Facilities. Building structures and facilities constructed,
16 or to be constructed, within the Department of Transportation's operating right of way that facilitate
17 maintaining the highway system and are used to assist in the operational and maintenance activities for all
18 roads, shall not be subject to zoning, subdivision, or building code ordinances or regulations by any
19 political subdivision of the State. Types of structures may include; equipment sheds, crew quarters,
20 equipment maintenance , equipment washing , material storage sheds (i.e. salt, sand and other bulk
21 materials), fuel centers, and other maintenance structures required to maintain the highway system such as
22 security (cameras and fences) including necessary maintenance and replacement items such as upgrades to
23 existing facilities. The Department shall not construct any such facility without first conducting a public
24 workshop to describe such plans and gather public input into the effect of such plans.

25 Section 96. Transportation Enhancements. (a) It is the intent of the General Assembly that the
26 Department provide notice to all State agencies, political sub-divisions within the State, and other parties of

1 the availability of, and rules governing, the Transportation Enhancements program. Such notice shall
2 include, but not be limited to, the definitions of eligible projects, the requirements for matching funds, and
3 such other requirements as may be necessary to insure that any interested entity may work to become a
4 participating recipient under the program. For new projects, the Department of Transportation is directed to
5 submit a detailed list of all projects funded within the Transportation Enhancement Program to the Office of
6 Management and Budget and Office of the Controller General on an annual basis. The State funding for
7 this program shall be limited to the required 20 percent match of the related Federal Authorization. The
8 projects funded by this program shall be limited to the allowable categories as outlined by the Federal
9 Highway Administration. Any deviation from this process must be approved by the Office of Management
10 and Budget, Office of the Controller General and Co-Chairs of the Joint Committee on Capital
11 Improvements.

12 (b) Upon the award of Transportation Enhancement Program funds and prior to the allocation of
13 funding for any Transportation Enhancement project, the Department of Transportation shall notify the
14 respective senators and representatives in which said project shall be located.

15 Section 97. Grants and Allocations. The Section 1 Addendum of this Act appropriates the sum of
16 \$20,075,000 (State) for projects within the Grants and Allocations classification. The General Assembly
17 further defines its intent with respect to those appropriations as follows:

18 (a) The sum of \$15,075,000 (State) shall be used for the Community Transportation Fund, in
19 accordance with the rules and regulations as adopted by the Joint Legislative Committee on the Capital
20 Improvements Program, as amended from time to time.

21 (b) The sum of \$1,000,000 (State), added to the Fiscal Year 2011 allocation of \$4,000,000 shall be
22 used for the Municipal Street Aid program, pursuant to the provisions of 30 Del. C. c. 51 for a total of
23 \$5,000,000 for Fiscal Year 2012. The additional funding will be only dedicated to improvements involving
24 respective municipalities' roads and bridges.

1 Section 98. 5310 Program. The Delaware Transit Corporation is authorized to expend up to
2 \$1,329,700 (\$859,200 State; \$470,500 Federal) from the Transit System classification (73/00) appropriated
3 in this Act for the 5310 Program, administered by the Federal Transit Authority.

4 Section 99. DeIDOT Work Impacts on Private Property and its Owners. When the Department
5 and/or any of its contractors determines that it would be in the best interests of the State to undertake
6 construction/reconstruction work past 9:00 p.m. or before 7:00 a.m., and such work is to be conducted
7 immediately adjacent to a residential neighborhood.

8 (a) The Department shall first ensure that residents of the neighborhood are notified in a timely
9 fashion of the Department's desire to undertake such work. It must explain the benefits and costs to the
10 State and the neighborhood of working under regular hours and the proposed extended hour schedule. Such
11 notifications shall include a description of the proposed work to be conducted, the proposed use of any
12 equipment that may cause noise, vibration or odor disruptions to the neighborhood, and an estimate of the
13 time required to complete the project. The Department may proceed with its extended hours of work if it
14 does not receive a significant number of objections from the notified residents. Pursuant to the provisions
15 of the Delaware Code, it shall offer temporary relocation to any residents who request such relocation.

16 (b) The Department may proceed with its extended hours of work so long as jack hammering or
17 other high noise activities do not impose an excessive nuisance to residents within the designated work
18 zone.

19 (c) If the Department determines that the proposed work (regardless of its scheduled time) will
20 produce noise that exceeds the applicable noise ordinances of the appropriate jurisdiction, the Department
21 shall ensure that it seeks and receives a waiver from that jurisdiction before commencing the work.

22 (d) If the Department determines that the proposed work may cause any vibration or other damage
23 to neighboring property, it shall complete a pre-work survey of the potentially affected properties to
24 determine the base-line condition of those properties. It shall monitor the properties during construction to
25 insure that any vibration or other damage is minimized. If any damage does occur, the Department must
26 reimburse the private property owners pursuant to the provisions of the Delaware Code. The Secretary of

1 the Department may waive the provisions of this section if he/she determines that any such work is
2 necessary in order to respond effectively to an emergency caused by a natural disaster, an accident, or a
3 failure of a transportation investment.

4 Section 100. McMullen Farm. The General Assembly has previously authorized the Department to
5 enter into contracts with the owners of property located in Bear, Delaware known as the McMullen Farm in
6 order to promote improved transportation access and circulation, to promote healthy economic growth, and
7 to preserve and enhance critical open space. The Department is authorized to continue its negotiations for
8 the improvements to Routes 7 and 40, to the system of roads connecting to these arteries, and to the lands
9 adjacent between the bounds of Route 273 and Route 40, Route 1 and Salem Church Road. All previous
10 authorizations to the Department, and other affected State agencies, shall remain in force and effect, and the
11 Secretary of the Department shall report to the Governor and the General Assembly on progress toward the
12 completion of the transportation improvements, development of the excess lands, and creation and
13 improvement of the community parkland no later than May 1, 2012.

14 Section 101. Indian River Inlet Bridge. State funds authorized in this and previous Acts of the
15 General Assembly for the design and construction of a new bridge at the Indian River Inlet and the
16 construction of new park amenities, access and circulation roads, and other transportation and recreation
17 improvements shall be used, to the maximum extent possible, to match federal funds previously available,
18 or to become available in the future. In keeping with the strong sense of community involvement and sense
19 of ownership, the Department shall continue to provide periodic progress updates through such media as it
20 determines to best address the community's needs. And finally, because in order to accomplish this project
21 in an efficient and cost-effective manner, the Department and its contractors will have to occupy portions of
22 the State's adjacent campground and marina facilities, the General Assembly authorizes and directs the
23 Secretary of the Department to enter into reimbursement agreements with the Secretary of DNREC. Such
24 agreements will insure that during the period of construction of the bridge and other necessary
25 improvements, DNREC shall be equitably indemnified from the loss of critical tourist revenues, which are
26 necessary to fund the operations of all of the State's outdoor recreational facilities.

1 Section 102. City of Wilmington Beautification. In order to maintain the urban tree canopy
2 available in the City of Wilmington, the General Assembly authorizes and directs the Department to
3 establish, and maintain a program of tree maintenance and replacement in cooperation with the Delaware
4 Center for Horticulture (Center) and/or Urban Forestry in the Department of Agriculture. It is the intent of
5 the General Assembly that such program shall be funded exclusively by allocations made from time to time
6 by members of the General Assembly from their Community Transportation Funds (“CTF”). The
7 Department shall make payments to the Center and/or Urban Forestry in the Department of Agriculture for
8 work accomplished, and appropriately vouchered, from the CTF funds herein identified.

9 Section 103. Supplies of Road Materials. Section 109 of 74 Del. Laws, c. 308 is suspended until
10 such time as the Department of Transportation shall suggest its re-institution and such suspension has been
11 overridden by an Act of the General Assembly.

12 Section 104. System Capacity Preservation. The General Assembly hereby determines that it is in
13 the public interest to limit future residential, commercial, or industrial growth along certain portions of the
14 State’s highway network. Such potential growth would produce unsafe driving conditions as increased
15 traffic seeks access to, and movements along, a number of local roads and collectors in critical locations
16 through the State. The General Assembly further determines that it would be infeasible or imprudent for
17 the Department to attempt to design and construct modifications to the State’s highway network adjacent to
18 these locations because such improvements would irrevocably destroy the important scenic and historic
19 nature of the view sheds and other environmental attributes associated with these locations. Accordingly,
20 the Secretary of the Department of Transportation (Secretary) is authorized and directed to use State funds
21 appropriated to the Transportation Enhancements program authorized and funded in the Section 1
22 Addendum of 74 Del. Laws, c. 308, together with such other funds from any public or private source as
23 may be available and appropriate, to purchase land, or such rights in land, as the Secretary deems necessary
24 to protect the following properties, pursuant to the stipulations stated herein. Expenditures of these funds
25 for these purposes shall be with the review and approval of the Director of the Office of Management and

1 Budget and Controller General. The provisions of 17 Del. C. c. 1 and 29 Del. C. c. 93 and 95 shall govern
2 such purchases, and any other purchase by the Department authorized by this Act.

3 (a) Millcreek Farm (Yearsley) Property - Four parcels totaling approximately 35 +/- acres
4 adjacent to Mill Creek (SR 282) and Stoney Batter (SR 283) Roads in New Castle County. The Department
5 shall work with members of the surrounding community, plus State and local officials, to develop a master
6 plan for the permanent protection of the site as community recreation and open space, and upon satisfactory
7 completion of such plans, may transfer the parcel to New Castle County for a fee to be determined.

8 Section 105. Denny Road/Route 896 Alignment Completion. Upon completion and final
9 inspection of the Denny Road/Route 896 Realignment Project, the frontage property consisting of two
10 parcels (0.93 and 0.929 acres) along Route 896, currently landscaped and maintained by the community of
11 Meadow Glen, shall revert back to the community which had owned said parcels prior to 1994.
12 Notwithstanding the provisions of 17 Del. C. §137, the Department shall deed these parcels to the
13 community and remain in their possession in perpetuity.

14 Section 106. Port of Wilmington. Subject to the review and approval of the Board of Directors of
15 the Diamond State Port Corporation (DSPC):

16 (a) DSPC may make application to the Delaware River and Bay Authority (DRBA) for such
17 assistance in the acquisition and improvement of facilities at the Port as the Board of the DSPC deems
18 appropriate, in accordance with the Compact authorized under 17 Del. C. §1701. For purposes of those
19 negotiations, any such project selected by the DSPC shall be construed to have been approved by the
20 General Assembly and Governor as required by law subject to the conditions that any such project shall be
21 subject to 29 Del. C. c. 69 and that such projects are subject to the approval of the Director of the Office of
22 Management and Budget, the Controller General and the Co-Chairs of the Joint Legislative Committee on
23 the Capital Improvement Program.

24 (b) DSPC is authorized to arrange for the lease of equipment from the State's master lease, secured
25 by the State's full faith and credit, in an amount not to exceed \$5,000,000 in the aggregate. The
26 expenditure of these funds and the terms of the lease shall be subject to the review and approval of the

1 Board of Directors of DSPC. A report of equipment leased including terms and amounts due shall be made
2 available to the Secretary of Finance, Director of the Office of Management and Budget and Controller
3 General annually.

4 Section 107. Wakefield Drive. The Department of Transportation shall be prohibited from
5 reopening Wakefield Drive in Newark through to Old Baltimore Pike.

6 Section 108. Community Transportation Funding Levels. The Department is directed to account
7 for the Community Transportation Program funds as cash which shall be equal to the amounts authorized in
8 Appendix A of this Act as well as previous Bond and Capital Improvements Acts. The funds authorized
9 within the Community Transportation program shall not be subject to reallocation by the Department under
10 any circumstances.

11 Section 109. Design-Build Contracts. The Department of Transportation is hereby authorized to
12 continue utilization of the design-build contract mechanism for a total of twelve transportation construction
13 projects (nine of which have been authorized). Design-build is a project delivery method under which a
14 project owner, having defined its initial expectations to a certain extent, executes a single contract for both
15 architectural/engineering services and construction. The selection processes and other terms of such
16 contracts may vary considerably from project to project. The design-build entity may be a single firm, a
17 consortium, joint venture, or other organization. However, the fundamental element of design-build
18 delivery remains that one entity assumes primary responsibility for design and construction of the project.
19 The Department of Transportation is authorized to continue the use of these experimental approaches to
20 completing its projects, subject to the following conditions:

21 (a) The contract terms shall include provisions to pay the prevailing wage rates determined by the
22 Department of Labor, as provided in 29 Del. C. §6960, in conjunction with Federal prevailing wage rates
23 for such work;

24 (b) The following additional provisions of 29 Del. C. c. 69 shall also be incorporated into these
25 design-build contracts: §6962(d)(4)a. (anti-pollution, conservation environmental measures); §6962(d)(7)
26 (equal employment opportunity assurances); and §6962(d)(8)(performance bonding requirements);

1 (c) Any such contracts shall conform to all applicable Federal laws and regulations concerning
2 design-build contracting, including but not limited to 23 C.F.R. Part 636, without regard to the source of
3 funds; and

4 (d) Any design-build contract for the construction of any transportation facility shall also be
5 subject to the provisions of 17 Del. C. c. 8 (construction payments held in trust for protection of
6 subcontractors and suppliers).

7 All other provisions of 29 Del. C. c. 69 shall not be applicable to these projects. The Co-Chairs of
8 the Joint Legislative Committee on the Capital Improvement Program and the Director of the Office of
9 Management and Budget shall approve all other projects subject to this section.

10 Section 110. New Development Road Widening. When planning and/or permitting additional road
11 widening directly related to new residential development, the Department of Transportation, Division of
12 Planning, shall make every attempt to require the necessary right-of-way land be acquired from the
13 developer owned land.

14 Section 111. W. L. Gore Site. In evaluating and recommending improvements to the
15 transportation system related to the development of what is known as the W.L. Gore site, located in New
16 Castle County and situated on the north side of Sunset Lake – east of SR896 and southeast of Old Cooch’s
17 Bridge Road, the department will make every effort to ensure that the improvements made facilitate and
18 encourage traffic to travel toward and use SR896 and to discourage additional use of Old Cooch’s Bridge
19 Road east of the entrance to the W.L. Gore property. This is in recognition of the historic characteristics of
20 Old Cooch’s Bridge Road in the vicinity of the intersection with Old Baltimore Pike.

21 Section 112. Route 301 Spur Road Segment. The General Assembly directs the Department to
22 implement the US 301 Corridor project in Phases, beginning with the US 301 mainline section.

23 Section 113. Astra Zeneca Project. The Department shall carry out property boundary adjustments
24 and easements for transit, bicycle and pedestrian, storm water management, wetlands and stream
25 restoration, beautification, historic preservation, conservation and other improvements in concert with
26 DNREC, DEDO, City of Wilmington, New Castle County, New Castle County Conservation District, and

1 such other public and private entities as may be necessary to accomplish timely completion of the Blue 4
2 Ball Master Plan.

3 Section 114. Buck Road. The Department of Transportation is requested to refrain from issuing
4 any entrance permit, authorization, or approval for use of any entrance way from New Castle County Parcel
5 Number 0702600094 onto Buck Road, until such time as it also certifies by letter to the New Castle County
6 Department of Land Use that the developer's proposed entrance design meets the Department's standards,
7 pursuant to its authority under Title 17 Del. C. §146 and its related regulations, intended to protect public
8 safety and maintain smooth traffic flow. The government of New Castle County is also requested to solicit
9 comments from and work with the residents of surrounding communities, community organizations, and
10 State and local officials to address traffic safety and other legitimate land use concerns about the proposed
11 development, after the receipt of the Department's letter.

12 Section 115. Routes 141 and 48. The Department of Transportation is requested to refrain from
13 issuing any permit, authorization, or approval for use of any new, additional, revised, or modified entrances
14 for New Castle County Parcel Numbers 07-032.20-003, 07-032.20-048 through and including 07-032.20-
15 055, 07-032.20-057 and 07-032.30-072 onto or from Route 141 or Route 48, until such time as the
16 Department obtains, reviews, and comments upon a traffic operations analysis for the area, which among
17 other elements addresses (1) the predicted levels of service on intersections, roadways, or the Tyler
18 McConnell Bridge affected by the proposed development of these parcels, and (2) the roadway
19 improvements necessary to accommodate the development of these parcels, based upon the exploratory
20 development plans submitted to the New Castle County Department of Land Use by the developer, as
21 required by the County's Unified Development Code (UDC). To the extent that any submission of
22 proposed development plans is substantially different than the original exploratory development plans
23 submitted to the County, the Department is further requested to assess the impact of the new submission's
24 traffic generation upon the local transportation network. The scope of the assessment shall be at the
25 reasonable discretion of the Department.

1 Section 116. Delaware Children’s Theatre. Notwithstanding the provisions of 17 Del. C. §137(b),
2 the Department of Transportation is hereby authorized to deed a 0.16 acre parcel, of unused operating State
3 right of way adjacent to New Castle County Tax Assessment map parcel #26-021.30-124, located at 1014
4 Delaware Avenue, Wilmington, Delaware to the Delaware Children’s Theatre. Said parcel shall be deeded
5 with complete vehicular denial of access along the right of way and shall be subject to any existing utilities
6 of record. The deed shall have a reversionary clause should the Department ever need a portion for a public
7 purpose project.

8 Section 117. DMV New Castle Facility. (a) Section 1 of this Act makes an appropriation to the
9 Department of Transportation, Support Systems; under Transportation Facilities appropriation for the
10 design and construction of a new Division of Motor Vehicle (DMV) facility in New Castle County. The
11 new facility will be located at the existing Mid County transit hub, which is currently owned by DelDOT.
12 This new facility will replace the current DMV site currently located on Airport Road. While funding for
13 the project is included in the Transportation Trust Fund, and is proposed to be matched with federal
14 congestion mitigation funds, the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) – Division of Facilities
15 Management will manage the construction process with oversight from DelDOT’s Support Services
16 personnel.

17 (b) It is the intent of the General Assembly that the Department of Transportation provide for an
18 inclusive and open process whereby the views and ideas of the residents in the neighborhoods surrounding
19 the Airport Road Facility be gathered and provided to the Office of Management and Budget and
20 considered prior to any future plans or commitments being made regarding the facility.

21 Section 118. Red Light Safety Enforcement. (a) The program shall continue to use recognized
22 safety and accident criteria in determining whether and where to add any new enforcement locations to this
23 program, and in any event shall continue to confirm that any such new locations are not objected to by the
24 incumbent state Senator and Representative for the districts in which such locations are proposed.

25 (b) To assure integrity and propriety, no person involved in the administration or enforcement of
26 this program shall own any interest or equity in the vendor used by the Department to support the

1 administrative elements of the program. Any such person with an ownership or equity interest in such
2 vendor must divest from this ownership or investment no later than ninety days after the effective date of
3 this act. This restriction applies to anyone with either direct involvement in administering or enforcing this
4 program and those in any supervisory capacity above such persons.

5 Section 119. Craft Training. The Department of Transportation is authorized to engage in up to
6 two project procurements (one in New Castle County and one in Kent County) utilizing the craft training
7 and apprentice program called for in 29 Del. C. §6962(c), on an experimental basis. Any contractor that
8 performs work in multiple trades on a road construction project under the craft training experiment will
9 have an apprenticeship in at least one, not all of the trades on the project to comply with this experiment.
10 Upon the completion of these experiments, the Department shall report to the Joint Legislative Committee
11 on the Capital Improvement Program with its assessment of the program including, but not limited to, cost
12 savings, project quality and worker safety.

13 Section 120. Chestnut Hill Road Parcel. The provisions of 17 Del. C. §137 notwithstanding, the
14 Department of Transportation is authorized to enter into agreements with other governmental agencies,
15 either directly or in concert with a private entity, regarding a Department-owned parcel known as NC227,
16 tax parcel no. 11-003.30-027, on terms the Department Secretary deems appropriate, for purposes of
17 evaluating the costs and benefits of fuel cell technology from environmental and economic development
18 perspectives, which the General Assembly hereby finds is an appropriate public purpose.

19 Section 121. Delaware Solid Waste Authority. Through a series of Custodial Resolutions dating
20 back to June 29, 1979 the Department of Transportation made available to the Delaware Solid Waste
21 Authority (DSWA) three parcels of land designated as parcels “A”, “B” and “C” which were of no further
22 use to the Department and which have since been incorporated into DSWA’s Central Solid Waste Facility
23 (Sandtown) Landfill Operations. The provisions of 17 Del. C. Section 137 notwithstanding, the Secretary of
24 the Department is authorized and directed to transfer to DSWA by quitclaim deed all its right, title and
25 interest to Parcels “A”, “B” and “C” as shown on the Plot designated as Exhibit No. 1 to the Custodial

1 Resolution between DelDOT and DSWA dated December 10, 1998, such transfer to be made within ninety
2 (90) days of the date of this enactment.

3 Section 122. Possum Park Road. The Department of Transportation is requested to refrain from
4 issuing any entrance permit, authorization, or approval for use of any entrance or entrances for a land use
5 development project proposed to be located on the west side of Possum Park Road (Delaware Route
6 72/New Castle Road 314) and the north side of Kirkwood Highway (Delaware Route 2/New Castle Road
7 11) until such time as the Department re-evaluates a February 4, 2010 traffic impact study for the project,
8 taking into account the current timeline for its own SR2 and SR72 Intersection Improvement Project
9 (Contract No. 28-007-05) and its Possum Park Road and Old Possum Park Road Intersection Improvements
10 Project (Contract No. 29-041-09), as well as any noted changes in the area's traffic conditions since
11 February 2010. The Department is requested to complete this re-evaluation before September 30, 2011, and
12 to share the results of that re-evaluation with the government of New Castle County. The government of
13 New Castle County is also requested to solicit comments from and work with the residents of surrounding
14 communities, community organizations, and State and local officials to address traffic safety and other
15 legitimate land use concerns about the proposed development project, after the receipt of the Department's
16 letter detailing the results of its re-evaluation.

17 Section 123. Rehabilitation of Public Streets, Industrial Parks. In order to maintain a safe,
18 attractive, and efficient network of public streets serving the state's growing inventory of industrial parks,
19 the General Assembly hereby authorizes the Department to spend sums not exceeding \$250,000 on a pilot
20 program to address this issue. The Department shall prepare an inventory of all public streets within the
21 state's industrial parks. It shall further rank all of these streets in the same manner that it prepares the
22 annual program of roads eligible for the Paving and Rehabilitation Program authorized elsewhere in this
23 Act. The Secretary shall then distribute this list to all members of the General Assembly, together with an
24 estimate of the amounts necessary to address those public streets in this inventory most in need of repair. If
25 a member of the General Assembly elects to allocate funds from his/her Community Transportation Fund
26 (CTF) to repair any of these public streets, the Secretary may draw on this appropriation to match those

1 individual CTF dollars on the basis of \$1 dollar from this special account for every \$1 dollar allocated by
2 the member. The Secretary shall notify all members of his intent to make such matching allocations, and
3 shall require any member interested in participating to notify the Department of his/her interest in
4 participating by a date certain, not less than one month from the date of such announcement. In the event
5 that the sum of all individual Member requests exceeds the amounts authorized by this section, the
6 Department shall prioritize the industrial park streets to be improved on the basis of the ranking required by
7 this section, and shall share its decisions with all members of the General Assembly. For purposes of
8 preparing this inventory and ranking, the Department is authorized and directed to expend such sums as
9 may be necessary from the accounts established for statewide paving and rehabilitation activities.

10 Section 124. Community Transportation Funds Work Group. The Department of Transportation is
11 directed to meet with a group of those legislators interested in reviewing the estimating and contracting
12 processes currently used for projects funded through Community Transportation Funds. The incoming
13 Secretary is requested to convene this meeting and report to the co-chairs of the Joint Legislative
14 Committee on the Capital Improvement Program by October 31, 2011.

15 Section 125. Rehoboth Beach Fire Company. Notwithstanding the provisions of Title 29 to the
16 contrary, the Delaware Department of Transportation is hereby authorized to use Community
17 Transportation Funds for a one-time reimbursement to the Rehoboth Beach Fire Company. The
18 Department shall be authorized to reimburse the Rehoboth Beach Fire Company in the amount of \$5,323.00
19 for reimbursement of a traffic calming device.

20 Section 126. West Dover Connector. a) The State recognizes the Department of Transportation's
21 West Dover Connector Project as a high priority for the City of Dover and for Kent County. The project
22 will improve the flow of traffic and reduce congestion for Dover's west side, and provide additional
23 connections for pedestrians and bicycles. In developing the project, the Department worked with officials
24 from Dover, the City of Camden, the Town of Wyoming, Kent County Levy Court, as well as property
25 owners and the public. In connection with this project, the headquarters of the Delmarva Council of the
26 Boy Scouts of America will be located on a portion of a property affected by the project, identified

1 previously as County Tax Map Numbers (2-00-085.00-02-04.00-00001) and (2-00-085.00-02-05.00-
2 00001) and identified currently as (2-00-085.00-02-04.00-00001), (2-00-085.00-02-05.00-00001), (2-00-
3 085.00-02-05.02-00001), and (2-00-085.00-02-05.03-00001). In addition, woods and fields will be
4 preserved for use by Boy Scouts. The County will construct active recreation facilities on another portion
5 of the property and the project will provide context-sensitive access to the property.

6 b) The State notes the cooperative efforts of the Department and the Boy Scouts concerning their
7 respective projects. To realize some of the benefits of these efforts, a twelve-hundred-foot portion of one of
8 the access roads needs to be constructed as part of the Boy Scouts' project, to allow access to the Boy
9 Scouts' property to be constructed and opened for traffic, and avoid the construction and subsequent
10 demolition of a temporary driveway.

11 c) Therefore, and notwithstanding any provision of state law to the contrary, the Department is
12 authorized to enter into such agreements it deems necessary and proper to reimburse the Delmarva Council
13 of The Boy Scouts of America for its actual expenditures for the creation of the public portion of the access
14 road needed to reach its entrance, provided that (a) such reimbursement will not exceed the unit prices
15 historically paid by the Department for the work items, and (b) the road improvements for which the
16 Department reimburses the Boy Scouts are built to Department standards, and (c) the construction of these
17 improvements has been inspected and accepted by the Department or its authorized agents.

1 **DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE**

2 Section 127. Farmland Preservation. For the fiscal year ending June 30, 2012, upon passage of
3 legislation establishing the Farmland Purchase and Preservation Loan Program (“Delaware Young Farmer
4 Program”), \$3,000,000 of the \$10,000,000 allocated for Farmland Preservation Funding shall be utilized by
5 the Aglands Preservation Foundation in accordance with the rules and policies for the Delaware Young
6 Farmer Program. All remaining state-appropriated funds shall be utilized by the Aglands Preservation
7 Foundation to preserve eligible farms statewide through the traditional farmland preservation program at its
8 discretion in accordance with Aglands Foundation rules and policies. Local jurisdiction funds committed to
9 farmland preservation for Fiscal Year 2012 shall be spent to preserve farmland only in the respective
10 jurisdictions where the funds originate. Farms to be preserved shall be selected by the local jurisdictions
11 according to the jurisdictions selection criteria from eligible farms as listed by the Aglands Preservation
12 Foundation. Similarly, any funds provided by nongovernment organizations shall be spent according to
13 their selection criteria from eligible farms as listed by the Aglands Preservation Foundation.

FIRE PREVENTION COMMISSION

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Section 128. Hydraulic Rescue Tools Replacement. It is the intent of the General Assembly that the funds authorized in the Section 1 Addendum of this Act be used to reimburse the Fire School, Minquadale and Talleyville fire companies. Upon submitting the receipt of sale, each company will be reimbursed up to \$7,500 by the Fire Prevention Commission - State Fire School (75-02-01).

1 **DELAWARE TECHNICAL AND COMMUNITY COLLEGE**

2 Section 129. College-wide Asset Preservation Program. The Section 1 Addendum of this Act
3 provides funds for Delaware Technical and Community College (90-04-00) for the College-wide Asset
4 Preservation Program. This appropriation may be used for the acquisition of computer hardware and
5 software.

1 **DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION**

2 Section 130. School Building and Custodial Verification. By September 30 of each calendar year,
3 each school district shall notify the Department of Education of its intended use for each school building
4 and administrative office building. School districts shall notify the Department about changes in the use of
5 such buildings to include the sale of property, closing of a building, lease of property to another agency, and
6 additions and renovations. The Department of Education shall establish a standard reporting mechanism
7 that school districts shall utilize to gather and submit required information.

8 By October 30 of each calendar year, the Department of Education shall verify and reissue
9 custodial allocations to each school district based on the information obtained annually.

10 Section 131. Land Donation for School Construction. Any land donated to a school district with
11 an approved major capital improvement program shall be required to return to the State one-half of the
12 State share amount originally budgeted for land purchase costs. In such case, the district shall be entitled to
13 keep the remaining one-half State share amount, as well as the full local share amount in accordance with
14 the certificate of necessity.

15 Section 132. Minor Capital Improvements. It is the intent of the General Assembly that the sum of
16 \$10,023,800 allocated in the Section 1 Addendum to this Act be used for minor capital improvements to
17 school buildings in the following amounts. Districts must use the funds in the amounts below on projects
18 listed on the facility assessment website hosted by the Department of Education.

21 Section 133. Dickinson High School. Funding provided to the Red Clay School District for

22 Equalization as provided for in the Fiscal Year 2012 Annual Appropriations Act shall be contingent upon

23 the following:

24 (a) The lighted football field at Dickinson High School may be used at night only for Dickinson home
25 games and Dickinson band practice; and

26 (b) The District is required to maintain the fencing between Dickinson High School and the community
27 of Montclare, keep the gate between the properties locked at all times (except by mutual agreement between

1 the District and the Montclare Civic Association), and provide, maintain and replace, if necessary, the
2 Leland Cypress trees along the fence line bordering the homes on Salem Drive.

3 Section 134. School Construction Fund Transfers. Notwithstanding any law or other provision to
4 the contrary, the Department of Education, with the approval of the Director of the Office of Management
5 and Budget and Controller General, may transfer funding between major capital construction projects
6 within the respective school districts. These transfers shall not authorize any changes in conditions or incur
7 any obligations in excess of the approved Certificate(s) of Necessity.

8 Section 135. School District Financial Reviews. It is the intent of the General Assembly that for
9 school districts receiving funds appropriated in the Section 1 Addendum to this Act, should a school district
10 financial position report as required under 14 Del. C. § 1507 demonstrate less than one month of carryover,
11 or if at any time during the course of the fiscal year a school district is projected to not be able to satisfy its
12 local payroll obligations, the Director of the Office of Management and Budget, in coordination with the
13 Secretary of Education and Controller General, is authorized to conduct a comprehensive review of the
14 school district's capital construction program.

15 Section 136. School Construction Contractual Documents. Effective January 1, 2007, all school
16 districts that receive State funds for major capital construction projects shall use standard bid and contract
17 documents developed by the Office of Management and Budget, Facilities Management. School districts
18 may enhance the standard bid and contract documents with additional contractual or project-specific
19 requirements as long as the enhancements do not diminish and are not in conflict with the provisions of the
20 standard documents. The Department of Education, in consultation with the Office of Management and
21 Budget, Facilities Management, shall approve any modifications or changes to the provisions of the
22 standard bid and contract documents before a school district may use or enhance the modified documents.

23 Section 137. Brandywine School District Space Consolidation and Grade Reconfiguration. The
24 Section 1 Addendum to 76 Del. Laws c. 79 appropriates \$1,600,000 to the Department of Education in
25 planning money for the renovation of Hanby Middle School in the Brandywine School District and further
26 authorized a local match share of \$1,066,700. In light of declining enrollment and to avoid increasing

1 operating costs, the District has decided to close the Hanby Middle School and has realigned the feeder
2 pattern for its remaining schools. The closure of the Hanby Middle School will allow the District to forego
3 the \$13,134,014 in state share and \$8,756,009 in local match share that would have been required to
4 renovate the school. In lieu of renovating the Hanby Middle School, the Brandywine School District is
5 hereby authorized to use the planning funds previously authorized to demolish the Hanby Middle School
6 and for other costs associated with the District’s Space Consolidation and Grade Reconfiguration Plan
7 approved by the Brandywine School District Board of Education on February 25, 2008. Approval is also
8 hereby given to construct the Brandywood Elementary School, approved on C.N. # 0631B, on the site of
9 Hanby Middle School and to complete the renovations of P.S du Pont, on C.N. # 0631C, as a Middle
10 School.

11 Notwithstanding any other state law or regulation to the contrary, the district is authorized to
12 transfer funds with the approval of the Director of the Office of Management and Budget and Controller
13 General across any of the approved Certificates of Necessity C.N. # 0631A-I to meet costs associated with
14 the transition to new grade configurations and to utilize such funds for expenses required to reconfigure
15 grade levels at Harlan Elementary School and Claymont Elementary School.

16 The Brandywine School District shall not be authorized to incur any obligation in excess of the
17 amounts listed on Certificates of Necessity #0631A-I.

18 Section 138. Milford School District – Access Road. To insure that property owned by the Milford
19 School District is used in accordance with the priorities established by the Milford School District Board of
20 Education, no state agency or municipality shall use said district property for any type of additional access
21 road without the approval of the Milford School District Board of Education. If the Milford School District
22 Board of Education does not publicly endorse, by affirmative vote, the placement of an additional access
23 road on district property, no state agency or municipality shall be authorized to condemn such district
24 property for said use.

25 Section 139. Brandywine School District Conveyances. (a) The General Assembly hereby
26 determines that it is in the public interest to reclaim a portion of the 13.97 acre parcel of land at 500 Duncan

1 Road, Wilmington, DE 19809 (New Castle County tax parcel ID number 06-132.00-188) (the “Duncan
2 Road Parcel”) held in a governmental capacity by the Brandywine School District in order for the State of
3 Delaware to convey to the Edgemoor Community Center, Inc. (“ECC”), a not for profit corporation of the
4 State of Delaware, an approximately 3.2 acre portion of said parcel (the “ECC Parcel”). ECC has provided
5 vital services to the citizens of Delaware since 1978, and has occupied the ECC Parcel exclusively since
6 1989. The General Assembly recognizes that as a titled owner of the ECC Parcel, ECC will be better able
7 to serve the citizens of Delaware and be better positioned to receive grants, including facilities improvement
8 grants. In addition, as a titled holder, ECC may immediately be able to lower its operational costs as it will
9 be able to renegotiate as a secured property holder outstanding debt currently being financed at unsecured
10 debtor rates.

11 The Duncan Road Parcel is hereby divided and title to the ECC Parcel is hereby conveyed to ECC,
12 with the buildings thereon erected, being bounded and described as follows to-wit:

13 BEGINNING at a point formed by the intersection of the Southwesterly side of Duncan Road (60
14 feet wide) with the Northwesterly side of Brandywine Boulevard (67.5 feet wide):

15 Thence, from said Point of Beginning the following thirty-three courses and distances:

- 16 (1) With the aforesaid side of Brandywine Boulevard this and the next three courses and
17 distances, South 42 degrees, 58 minutes, 38 seconds West, 364.88 feet to a point of

- 26 (4) By an arc curving to the right having a radius of 18.00 feet, an arc distance of 9.97 feet
27 (CHD=North 49 degrees, 32 minutes, 37 seconds West, 9.84 feet) to a point, thence;
- 28 (5) North 33 degrees, 40 minutes, 30 seconds West, 59.06 feet to a point of curvature, thence;
- 29 (6) By an arc curving to the left having a radius of 126.00 feet, an arc distance of 89.83 feet
30 (CHD=North 54 degrees, 05 minutes, 57 seconds West, 87.94 feet) to a point of tangency,
31 thence;
- 32 (7) North 74 degrees, 31 minutes, 23 seconds West, 24.34 feet to a point, thence through the
33 existing baseball field;

- 1 (8) North 36 degrees, 43 minutes, 40 seconds East, 199.57 to a point behind the proposed curb,
2 thence, parallel with same the next two courses an distances;
- 3 (9) South 53 degrees, 56 minutes, 32 seconds East, 69.07 feet to an point, thence crossing the
4 proposed lane;
- 5 (10) North 35 degrees, 57 minutes, 46 seconds East, 27.99 feet to a point behind the existing
6 curb, thence parallel to the aforesaid existing curb;
- 7 (11) North 53 degrees, 35 minutes, 55 seconds West, 80.57 feet to a point of curvature, thence;
- 8 (12) By an arc curving to the right having a radius of 70.00 feet, an arc distance of 20.54 feet
9 (CHD=North 45 degrees, 11 minutes, 30 seconds West, 20.47 feet) to a point of tangency,
10 thence;
- 11 (13) North 36 degrees, 47 minutes, 06 seconds West, 14.08 feet to a point of curvature, thence;
- 12 (14) By an arc curving to the left having a radius of 12.50 feet, an arc distance of 3.46 feet
13 (CHD=North 44 degrees, 42 minutes, 59 seconds West, 3.45 feet) to a point of tangency,
14 thence;
- 15 (15) North 52 degrees, 38 minutes, 53 seconds West, 9.04 feet to a point, thence;
- 16 (16) North 46 degrees, 44 minutes, 48 seconds West, 4.76 feet to a point, thence;
- 17 (17) North 54 degrees, 03 minutes, 32 seconds West, 20.41 feet to a point, thence;

- 27 (23) South 63 degrees, 46 minutes, 07 seconds East, 1.45 feet to a point on the roof overhang
28 and the edge of an interior courtyard, thence, with same the next two courses and distances;
- 29 (24) North 35 degrees, 50 minutes, 53 seconds East, 95.51 feet to a point, thence;
- 30 (25) South 54 degrees, 48 minutes, 34 seconds East, 6.12 feet to a point in line of a new
31 doorway threshold, thence, with same;
- 32 (26) North 36 degrees, 03 minutes, 21 seconds East, 23.61 feet to a point in line of a retaining
33 wall, thence , with same the next four courses and distances;
- 34 (27) North 53 degrees, 42 minutes, 38 seconds West, 2.07 feet to a point, thence;
- 35 (28) North 35 degrees, 19 minutes, 14 seconds East, 31.69 feet to a point, thence;
- 36 (29) North 54 degrees, 45 minutes, 19 seconds West, 2.47 feet to a point, thence;
- 37 (30) North 35 degrees, 48 minutes, 20 seconds East, 40.90 feet to a point along the existing back
38 of curb, thence, parallel with same the next two courses and distances;
- 39 (31) By an arc curving to the left having a radius of 52.00 feet, an arc distance of 25.11 feet
40 (CHD=North 50 degrees, 07 minutes, 28 seconds East, 24.87 feet) to a point of tangency,

1 thence;
2 (32) North 35 degrees, 55 minutes, 26 seconds East, 12.54 feet to a point on the aforesaid side
3 of Brandywine Boulevard, thence, with same;

4 (33) South 54 degrees, 04 minutes, 34 seconds East, 337.87 feet to the Point of Beginning.

5 Containing within said metes and bounds 3.2197 acres of land, be they the same, more or less.

6 Such description of the ECC Parcel shall remain binding and effective unless ECC and Brandywine
7 School District agree in writing to modify such description on or before September 30, 2010.

8 This conveyance shall be "as is" in that ECC shall accept any buildings erected on the parcel in
9 their present condition as of the time of conveyance, and shall be subject to all other covenants, conditions,
10 restrictions and easements of record, this reference to which shall not be construed to reimpose the same.

11 The Brandywine School District and ECC shall also negotiate in good faith to agree on mutually acceptable
12 easements and agreements to address issues including cross access, maintenance, and shared use of
13 property. Such easements or agreements shall guarantee to ECC continued water and sewer access at costs
14 pro rated to ECC's usage of such water and sewer services, and shall guarantee ECC use of and access to
15 any telephone, security alarm or other such ECC systems that remain on the Duncan Road Parcel but that
16 are not conveyed with the ECC Parcel.

17 All agencies reviewing the Minor Land Development Plan for the expansion of administrative
18 offices at the Duncan Road Parcel (New Castle County Application No. 2010-0235) shall review the plans
19 as the property existed prior to the subdivision of the property as directed herein. In addition, the Delaware
20 Department of Transportation shall grant a time extension of a maximum of twelve (12) months from the
21 time of the issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy for the expansion of the administrative offices by New
22 Castle County to complete the pedestrian improvements required by the Delaware Department of
23 Transportation within the public right-of-way for Duncan Road and Brandywine Boulevard.

24 Nothing in the subdivision of the Duncan Road Parcel shall prohibit the Brandywine School
25 District from expending funds approved under C.N. # 0631 F on the ECC Parcel that are required to
26 complete the relocation of its district office. ECC shall not be required to pay for any improvements to the

1 Duncan Road Parcel, including the ECC Parcel, as a result of or relating to Brandywine School District's
2 plans for the relocation of its district office.

3 (b) The General Assembly hereby determines that it is in the public interest to reclaim a portion of
4 the 26.25 acre parcel of land at 3301 Green Street, Claymont, DE 19703 (New Castle County tax parcel ID
5 number 06-071.00-106) held by the Brandywine School District in order for the State of Delaware to
6 convey to the Brandywine Community Resource Council, Inc. ("BCRC"), a not for profit corporation of the
7 State of Delaware that operates the Claymont Community Center, a portion of said parcel (the "CCC
8 Parcel"). The General Assembly also hereby determines that it is in the public interest to reclaim the 0.38
9 acre parcel, also at 3301 Green Street, Claymont, DE 19703 (New Castle County tax parcel ID number 06-
10 084.00-009) (the "Second CCC Parcel"), in order for the State of Delaware to convey such parcel to BCRC.
11 BCRC provides vital services to the citizens of Delaware and occupies the CCC Parcel and the Second
12 CCC Parcel exclusively. The General Assembly recognizes that as a titled owner of the CCC Parcel and
13 the Second CCC Parcel, BCRC will be better able to serve the citizens of Delaware and be better positioned
14 to receive grants, including facilities improvement grants.

15 Brandywine School District is hereby authorized and directed to convey the CCC Parcel and the
16 Second CCC Parcel to BCRC for the combined consideration of one dollar (\$1.00). The deed to the
17 aforesaid real property shall contain a provision whereby the Brandywine School District shall have the
18 right of first refusal to the property in the event that the BCRC wishes to vacate the property. If the BCRC
19 vacates the property and the Brandywine School District does not exercise its right of first refusal, proceeds
20 from the sale of said property shall be governed by the provisions 14 Del. C. § 1057(a)(15).

21 These conveyances shall be "as is" in that BCRC shall accept any buildings erected on the parcels
22 in their present condition as of the time of conveyance, and shall be subject to all other covenants,
23 conditions, restrictions and easements of record, this reference to which shall not be construed to reimpose
24 the same. The Brandywine School District and BCRC shall also negotiate in good faith to agree on
25 mutually acceptable easements and agreements to address issues including cross access, maintenance, and
26 shared use of property that BCRC and Brandywine School District deem necessary or appropriate.

1 Section 140. Claymont Community Center. In connection with the transfer of property directed
2 pursuant to Section § 135(b), 77 Del. Laws, Chapter 329, the Brandywine Community Resource Council
3 Inc. (BCRC) shall be liable for the payment of survey(s) and/or related transaction costs necessary to
4 determine whether any portion of the land that was conveyed pursuant to the above authority are portions of
5 land originally acquired by the Delaware Department of Transportation (DOT) for right-of-way purposes
6 for the construction of Interstate 95. To the extent any survey confirms that any portion of such lands are,
7 in fact, owned by the DOT, and notwithstanding any provisions of 17 Del. C. § 137 to the contrary, the
8 DOT, after receiving any and all necessary approvals from the federal government or any agent thereof for
9 transfer of such land, is further authorized to execute any and all necessary deeds to convey said portions of
10 land to the BCRC and/or the Brandywine School District on the same terms and conditions as the
11 Brandywine School District’s related conveyance to the BCRC pursuant to the above authority.

12 Section 141. New Castle County VoTech Bleachers Project. Of the \$1,531,500 (\$934,200 State
13 and \$597,300 local) appropriated for Fit-out St. Georges High School Auditorium, \$500,000 (\$305,000
14 State and \$195,000 local) is to be used to construct bleachers next to the artificial turf field at St. Georges.

15 Section 142. Richard Allen School Conveyance. a) Notwithstanding the provisions of Title 14,
16 §1057, the Indian River School District is hereby authorized and empowered to execute and deliver to the
17 Boys and Girls Club of Delaware Inc. a good and sufficient deed to transfer and convey all that certain
18 parcel of land all structures thereon, known as the Richard Allen School located in Sussex County,
19 Delaware (tax parcel 1-35 20-70). This conveyance shall be for consideration of \$1.00, and shall be “as is”
20 in the Boys and Girls Club of Delaware Inc. shall accept the building and land in their present condition as
21 of the time of conveyance.

22 b) The deed to the aforesaid property shall contain a provision whereby said property will revert to
23 the Indian River School District in the event the property or any part thereof ceases to be used by the Boy
24 and Girls of Delaware, Inc.

25 Section 143. Milford Transfer of Major Capital Construction Funds. The Milford school district,
26 with the approval of the Secretary of Education, the Director of the Office of Management and Budget and

1 the Controller General, is authorized to transfer non-obligated major capital improvement funds from the
2 Central Academy Project (Certificate of Necessity #0818-C-D) for the construction of an animal science
3 facility and land sciences laboratory on the Kent County Campus to be used by Central Academy and
4 Milford High School students.

5 Section 144. Bond Verification. All bonds issued, or herein before or herein authorized to be
6 issued, by the State are hereby determined to be within all debt and authorization limits of the State.

7 Section 145. Inconsistency. Insofar as the provisions of this Act are inconsistent with the
8 provisions of any general, special, or local laws, or parts thereof, the provisions of this Act shall be
9 controlling.

10 Section 146. Severability. If any section, part, phrase, or provision of this Act or the application
11 thereof be held invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such judgment shall be confined in its
12 operation to the section, part, phrase, provision, or application directly involved in the controversy in
13 which such judgment shall have been rendered and shall not affect or impair the validity of the remainder
14 of this Act or the application thereof.

15 Section 147. Effective Date. This Act shall take effect in accordance with the provisions of State
16 law.


