HOUSE BILL NO. 230

AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR CERTAIN GRANTS-IN-AID FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2016; SPECIFYING CERTAIN PROCEDURES, CONDITIONS AND LIMITATIONS FOR THE EXPENDITURE OF SUCH FUNDS, AMENDING THE FISCAL YEAR 2016 APPROPRIATIONS ACT.

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1 Section 5. In order to be considered for a Grant-in-Aid Appropriation under Section 1 or Section 2 of this Act,
2 an agency must meet the following criteria:

- 3 1. Be an incorporated non-profit (or under the umbrella of a parent organization which is an
4 incorporated, non-profit) for two years prior to receiving funding;
- 5 2. Have by-laws that clearly state the purpose of the Corporation and include definition of duties
6 of Board of Directors;
- 7 3. Have an active, community-represented, volunteer Board of Directors that sets policies, goals and
8 objectives, and maintains minutes of regularly scheduled meetings and any special meetings;
- 9 4. Have programs that are unduplicated by other state supported agencies and satisfy unmet human
10 needs of the community; have personnel policies including job descriptions and classifications;
- 11 5. No agency shall use Grant-in-Aid funds to pay any part of an elected official's salary or benefits;

20 Section 10. (a) It is the intent of the General Assembly that each Grant-in-Aid recipient shall submit one of the
21 following with its application for a grant award in Fiscal Year ~~2015~~2016:

- 22 (i) The most recent copy of the agency's audit completed by either a Certified Public Accountant or
23 a Public Accountant. The audit must have been issued within the past three years; or
- 24 (ii) If the agency is not able to provide an audit, the agency must submit a detailed statement of the
25 circumstances surrounding the reason. The lack of an audit may impact the ultimate funding decision of

27 (b) Fire companies listed in this Act shall submit financial information on the form approved by the State

13 via pass thrus, agency grants, or contracts. The Joint Finance Committee will also consider the percentage of an agency's
14 budget that is allocated to salaries and benefits.

15 It is also the intent of the Joint Finance Committee that the FY ~~2017~~ 2018 Grant-in-Aid application will require
16 that all agencies that apply for Grant-in-Aid must submit an audit prepared by a certified public accountant that had been
17 issued within the past three years of the date the application is due.

18 Section 12. The sums appropriated to the various Senior Centers in Section 1 of this Act shall be made
19 available to the Division of Services for Aging and Adults with Physical Disabilities in order to meet the State's
20 matching requirement for federal funds appropriated under the Older Americans Act of 1965, as amended. Those senior
21 centers receiving funds under the Older Americans Act of 1965, as amended, shall present to the Division of Services
22 for Aging and Adults with Physical Disabilities a proposal for expenditure of State funds. The proposal submitted to
23 the Division of Services for Aging and Adults with Physical Disabilities shall be prepared in accordance with the
24 guidelines established for the administration of programs under the Older Americans Act. To be considered for
25 funding, a senior center must meet the criteria established in Section 5. Funding will be determined by the Joint
26 Finance Committee based upon its evaluation and with advice from the University of Delaware Institute for Public
27 Administration.

28 Section 13. Section 1 of this Act makes an appropriation to the Department of Health & Social Services, Public
29 Health, Emergency Medical Services (35-05-30), for the state component of the operational costs associated with each

1 county's paramedic service for Advanced Life Support. These funds shall be disbursed by Emergency Medical Services on
2 a quarterly basis to counties that operate approved programs.

3 Emergency Medical Services shall have an audit performed by the State Auditor annually to insure that
4 reimbursement to the counties for the State share of costs was for approved Advanced Life Support Services. Adjustments
5 shall be made to the final quarterly reimbursement based on the audit results.

6 Section 14. Appropriations made in Section 1 of this Act to Emergency Medical Services and Aid to Local Law
7 Enforcement shall not be subject to the provisions in Sections 8, 9 and 10. Funds appropriated to Aid to Local Law
8 Enforcement shall not be subject to reversion at the end of the fiscal year if unexpended or unencumbered, but shall be
9 continued for a period of up to three years.

10 Section 15. (a) The funds appropriated in Section 1 for the Department of Safety and Homeland Security - Aid to
11 Local Law Enforcement and EIDE shall be allocated according to the formula presently used by the SALLE Committee as
12 revised from time to time. Expenditures from this fund must be approved by the Budget Director and the Controller
13 General.

14 (b) Local law enforcement agencies may combine their allocations, upon approval of the SALLE
15 Committee, to support a pool arrangement to fund a contiguous area served by more than one local law enforcement

11 \$6,000 or less from the line item Aid to Local Law Enforcement.

12 (c) The State Treasurer is authorized to take the necessary steps to make a total payment of the appropriation to
13 any Grant-in-Aid recipient receiving an amount of \$6,000 or less listed in Section 2 of this Act at the beginning of the first
14 quarter of Fiscal Year ~~2015~~2016.

15 (d) The State Treasurer is authorized to take the necessary steps to make a total payment of the appropriation to

17 (e) The State Treasurer is authorized to take the necessary steps to make a total payment of the appropriation to
18 organizations funded on a one-time basis in Section 1 of this Act at the beginning of the first quarter of Fiscal Year ~~2015~~

20 Section 18. Section 2 of this Act makes an appropriation to the Delaware State Fair. Of that amount, \$121,614
21 shall be used for prizes for achievements in agriculture, animal raising and in works of manual training and the domestic
22 arts to be awarded at the annual State Fair and \$5,000 shall be used for purses on Governor's Day which shall be paid by
23 the State Treasurer at the beginning of the first quarter of Fiscal Year ~~2015~~2016. The remainder of the appropriation shall
24 be paid in quarterly allotments, as provided in Chapter 65, §6505 of Title 29, Delaware Code.

25 Section 19. The appropriation in Section 2 of this Act to Camp Barnes, Inc. shall be used for the purpose of
26 maintaining and operating Camp Barnes for the recreation of deserving youths from throughout the State.

27 Section 20. Section 2 of this Act appropriates funds to the Delaware State Police Museum, Inc. These funds may
28 not be used for capital/construction costs.

29 Section 21. Section 2 of this Act makes an appropriation to the Historical Society of Delaware. Of that amount,
30 \$10,000 shall be used for the development and/or operations of the African American Heritage Center.

1 Section 22. The Delaware Safety Council may not discriminate against similar programs offered by other non-
2 profit or private agencies.

3 Section 23. It is the intent of the General Assembly that the Department of Health and Social Services, Division of
4 Public Health, continue funding the Alliance for Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention at the Fiscal Year 2006 contract levels.

5 Section 24. For Fiscal Year ~~2015~~2016, the remaining balance in the Fiscal Year 2006 account (25-01-01-21187)
6 Delaware Volunteer Fire Service Revolving Loan Fund shall remain as a continuing appropriation and shall not be subject
7 to reversion until June 30, ~~2015~~2016.

8 Section 25. Section 2 of this Act makes an appropriation to the Christina Cultural Arts Center. It is the intent of
9 the General Assembly that these funds shall support the Black Heritage Theater Ensemble and their efforts to educate
10 Delawareans on the contributions of Black Americans to the State's growth and development.

11 Section 26. Section 2 of this Act makes an appropriation to the Greater Philadelphia Chapter of the ALS
12 Association. It is the intent of the General Assembly that these funds shall only support Delaware residents.

13 Section 27. Section 1 of this Act makes an appropriation to the County Seat Package, of the amount appropriated
14 to the City of Wilmington up to \$300,000 shall be used for public safety.

15 Section 28. Section 1 of this Act makes an appropriation to the County Seat Package, of that amount \$50,000 is
16 appropriated to the City of Dover, \$7,000 is appropriated to the City of Georgetown and the balance will appropriated by
17 formula.

18 Section 29. It is the intent of the General Assembly ~~that beginning in~~ for Fiscal Year 2016 the State
19 reimbursement for the county paramedic program pursuant to 16 Del. C. 98 will be based on each county's expenditures for
20 the fiscal year two years prior to the fiscal year in which the paramedic program is to be funded.

21 Section 30. The Office of the Controller General and the University of Delaware Institute for Public
22 Administration will assess the feasibility of combining the grant-in-aid appropriations in the "Aging" category in Section 2
23 with the Services for Aging & Adults with Physical Disabilities – Senior Center appropriations in Section 1.

24 Section 31. Funds appropriated to any organization through this Act shall be kept in a separate bank account and
25 not comingled with any other funds. Upon request of the Controller General, agencies must provide bank account
26 statements showing all transactions using Grant-in-Aid funds.

27 Section 32. Amend the Fiscal Year 2016 Appropriations Act of the 148th General Assembly (House Substitute 1
28 for House Bill 225) by inserting a new Section 197 and by making insertions as shown by underlining and deletions as
29 shown by strike through as follows:

1 Section 198. (a) Section 1 of this Act appropriates \$2,225.0 to the Department of Services for Children, Youth and
2 Their Families, Prevention and Behavioral Health Services, Prevention/Early Intervention (37-04-20), for the purpose of
3 providing statewide after-school programs focused on youth violence, ~~and child suicide prevention~~ and evidence-based
4 summer reading instruction for students who are not beginning to read by age seven. Of this amount, up to \$500.0 shall be
5 allocated for the annual provision of regional evidence-based summer reading instructions for students who are not
6 beginning to read by age seven. Any unallocated amount can be used for the purpose of after-school programs focused on
7 youth violence and child suicide prevention. The Secretary of the Department of Children, Youth and Their Families,
8 supported by the Criminal Justice Council, may work with the Department of Education to determine allocation of said
9 funding.

10 (b) Section 1 of this Act appropriates funds to the Department of Children, Youth and Their -Families, Prevention
11 and Behavioral Health Services, Prevention/Early Intervention (37-04-20) in Middle School Behavioral Health for in
12 school behavioral health services. Of this amount, \$45.0 shall be allocated to the Mental Health Association for related
13 consultation services. An annual report to the Joint Finance Committee, the Director of the Office of Management and
14 Budget, and the Controller General by May 1 of each year, which will include but not be limited to the number of clients
15 served and related expenditures.

16 Section 33. To reduce State transportation costs and provide new mobility options for Delawareans, the general
17 Assembly directs the Secretary of the Department of Transportation to explore implementing a program that would
18 reallocate State spending on transportation supporting the paratransit program toward the purchase and operation of
19 accessible and energy efficient taxi-style vehicles. This effort shall include designing and administering a Request for
20 Information (RFI) for operating and managing a safe, affordable and reliable taxi-style service for paratransit customers,
21 and populations who cannot drive. Responses to the RFI should address the cost and potential use of alternative fuel
22 vehicles in providing this service. As part of the RFI, respondents will be asked to specify a measurable and time-sensitive
23 goal for providing a substantial percentage of paratransit trips with this new service. All viable proposals must maintain
24 compliance with existing eligibility standards for paratransit service in Delaware. The Secretary of the Department of
25 Transportation will submit a draft RFI and progress report to the co-chairs of the Joint Finance Committee and the
26 Controller General by November 1, 2015. A final RFI shall be issued by February 1, 2016.

27 Section 34. The International Baccalaureate Program at the John Dickinson High School in the Red Clay
28 Consolidated School District, currently serving grades 9-12, and being expanded to a middle school program for grades 6-8,
29 shall classify as a magnet program.
30

1 Section 35. Section 1 of the Fiscal Year 2016 Annual Appropriations Act provides an appropriation to the
2 Department of Education, School District Operations for Division III – Equalization and the Educational Sustainment Fund,
3 of which a share of this funding will be allocated to the Milford School District. Notwithstanding any provision of the
4 Delaware Code to the contrary, the Milford School District may use Division III-Equalization and/or the Educational
5 Sustainment Fund as local match for up to two portable classrooms. Should this option be exercised, the local match using
6 Division III-Equalization and/or the Educational Sustainment Fund may be spread over a five year period by withholding
7 the sum of \$13,800 from Milford School District’s allocation for Fiscal Years 2016 through 2020. The Milford School
8 District shall notify the Director of the Office of Management and Budget and the Controller General on its intent to use
9 Division III-Equalization and/or the Educational Sustainment Fund pursuant to this section no later than September 30,
10 2015.

11 Section 36. It is the legislative intent that \$8,580,000 in financial settlements, held in appropriation 29626, within
12 Legal, Office of the Attorney General (15-01-01), be allocated in the following manner:

13 (a) \$30,000 to Adult Basic Education;

14 (b) \$350,000 the Paramedic Instructional Program Expansion;

15 (c) \$202,569 for municipal law enforcement email accounts (10-07-02), of which the remaining cost is to remain
16 the responsibility of the municipalities in a pro-rated manner;

17 (d) \$1,797,431 for Emergency Medical Services, Paramedic Program Operations;

18 (e) \$5,000,000 for Contractual – E-ZPass Operations, Department of Transportation, Toll Administration (55-11-
19 60); and

20 (f) \$1,200,000 for Sussex County Police Agreement.

21 Section 37. Amend Section 239 of the Fiscal Year 2016 Appropriations Act of the 148th General Assembly
22 (House Substitute 1 for House Bill 225 by deleting said Section and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

23 **Section 239.** The Department of Safety and Homeland Security is hereby authorized to continue funding its share
24 of the existing 44 patrol officers that have been established through agreements between State Police (45-06-00) and Sussex
25 County Council. In Section 1 of this Act, ASF spending authority has been provided to Department of Safety and
26 Homeland Security, State Police, Patrol (45-06-03) in order to accommodate the match requirements (50/50 match)
27 stipulated by these agreements. In the event that the aforementioned agreements between State Police and Sussex County
28 Council are terminated, this authority shall be deauthorized.

1 Section 38. (a) Amend Section 1 of the Fiscal Year 2016 Operating Budget Act of the 148th General Assembly
