HOUSE BILL NO. 197

AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR CERTAIN GRANTS-IN-AID FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2024; SPECIFYING CERTAIN PROCEDURES, CONDITIONS AND LIMITATIONS FOR THE EXPENDITURE OF SUCH FUNDS; AMENDING THE FISCAL YEAR 2024 APPROPRIATIONS ACT; AMENDING THE FISCAL YEAR 2024 ONE-TIME SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATIONS ACT; AND AMENDING CERTAIN STATUTORY PROVISIONS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF DELAWARE (Three-fourths of all members elected to each house thereof concurring therein):

8	Section 8. Section 6505(d) of Title 29 of the Delaware Code provides that monies appropriated for
9	Grant-in-Aid in each fiscal year shall be paid in quarterly installments. For each fiscal year, payments shall
10	be paid in four equal installments, one each in July, October, January, and April. Upon notification by a
11	Co-Chair of the Joint Finance Committee or the Office of the Controller General, the State Treasurer shall
12	be directed to withhold such installment payment(s). An installment payment may also be delayed or
13	withheld if the Grant-in-Aid recipient:
14	(a) Has not submitted a quarterly statement of expenditures if required to do so.
15	(b) Expended funds from Grant-in-Aid for purposes not intended by the General Assembly.
16	(c) Expended funds for uses listed in Section 6.
17	(d) Agency Is ceasing some or all its activities, programs, or service(s) for which it has applied or is no
18	longer in operation. Any remaining funding may be reallocated upon approval from the Controller
19	General as determined by the Co-Chairs of the Joint Finance Committee.
20	(e) In the case of a senior center closing during the fiscal year, any remaining quarterly payments will
21	be retained in the Office of the Controller General. Disbursements from this account shall be made in
22	consultation with the University of Delaware and with the approval of the Co-Chairs of the Joint Finance
23	Committee.
24	Section 9. (a) It is the intent of the General Assembly that each Grant-in-Aid recipient shall submit
25	one of the following with its application for a grant award in each fiscal year:
26	(1) The most recent copy of the agency's audit completed by either a Certified Public
27	Accountant or a Public Accountant. The audit must have been issued within the past three
28	years.

(2) If the agency is not able to provide an audit, the agency must submit a detailed statement of
 the circumstances surrounding the reason. The lack of an audit may impact the ultimate
 funding decision of the Joint Finance Committee.

(b) Fire companies listed in this Act shall submit financial information on the form approved by the
State Treasurer, the Director of the Office of Management and Budget, and the Controller General. The listed
fire companies are exempt from the provisions of Subsection (a) of this Section. Financial forms will be
submitted to the State Fire School, and they will be responsible for forwarding copies of the forms to the
Office of the Controller General.

9 (c) Non-compliance by a Grant-in-Aid recipient with the provisions of this Section shall
10 automatically disqualify the applicant for consideration of a Grant-in-Aid award in the next fiscal year.

Section 10. It is the intent of the Joint Finance Committee to review all Grant-in-Aid applications and give consideration to the diversity of an agency's revenues, including the percentage of revenues that are from other State funding sources, agency grants, or contracts. The Joint Finance Committee will also consider the percentage of an agency's budget allocated to salaries and benefits.

15 Section 11. Section 1 of this Act makes an appropriation to the County Seat Package, of that amount, 16 \$100,000 is appropriated to the City of Dover, \$14,000 is appropriated to the City of Georgetown, and the 17 balance will be appropriated by formula. Of the amount appropriated to the City of Wilmington, up to 18 \$300,000 shall be used for public safety.

19 Section 12. (a) Section 1 of this Act makes an appropriation to the Department of Health and Social 20 Services, Public Health, Emergency Medical Services (35-05-30), for Paramedic Program Operations for the 21 state component of the operational costs associated with each county's paramedic service for Advanced Life 22 Support. It is the intent of the General Assembly that for each fiscal year, the state appropriation for county 23 paramedic program operations pursuant to 16 Del. C. Ch. 98 will be based on each county's adopted budget 24 for the fiscal year immediately prior to the fiscal year in which the paramedic program is to be funded. Such 25 payments shall be made pursuant to Section 8 of this Act. Further, it is the intent of the General Assembly to 26 review 16 Del. C. Ch. 98 to determine the most appropriate county and state cost share for the continued 27 support of this program.

(b) Emergency Medical Services shall have an audit performed by the State Auditor annually to
 ensure that reimbursement to the counties for the state share of costs was for approved Advanced Life Support
 Services. Adjustments shall be made to the final quarterly reimbursement based on the audit results.

4 Section 13. The sums appropriated to the various Senior Centers in Section 1 of this Act shall be 5 made available to the Department of Health and Social Services, Division of Services for Aging and Adults 6 with Physical Disabilities, Administration/Community Services (35-14-01), to meet the State's matching 7 requirement for federal funds appropriated under the Older Americans Act of 1965, as amended. Those senior 8 centers receiving funds under the Older Americans Act of 1965, as amended, shall present to the Division of 9 Services for Aging and Adults with Physical Disabilities a proposal for the expenditure of state funds. The 10 proposal submitted to the Division of Services for Aging and Adults with Physical Disabilities shall be 11 prepared in accordance with the guidelines established for the administration of programs under the Older 12 Americans Act. To be considered for funding, a senior center must meet the criteria established in Section 5. 13 Funding will be determined by the Joint Finance Committee based upon its evaluation and with advice from 14 the University of Delaware Institute for Public Administration (IPA). Any professional services contract the 15 IPA provides to the Office of the Controller General shall not contain an amount used to fund overhead or 16 student tuition expenses.

Section 14. It is the intent of the General Assembly that the Department of Health and Social
Services, Division of Public Health, continue funding the Alliance for Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention at the
Fiscal Year 2006 contract levels.

Section 15. (a) The funds appropriated in Section 1 for the Department of Safety and Homeland
Security (DSHS), Office of the Secretary, Administration (45-01-01), State Aid to Local Law Enforcement
(SALLE), and Emergency Illegal Drug Enforcement (EIDE), shall be allocated according to an application
process administered by the DSHS with the award amounts determined by the SALLE Committee.
Expenditures from these funds must be approved by the Director of the Office of Management and Budget and
the Controller General.

(b) Local law enforcement agencies may combine their allocations, upon approval of the SALLE
Committee, to support a pool arrangement to fund a contiguous area served by more than one local law
enforcement agency.

1	(c) Each local law enforcement agency contracting for an allocation shall, not later than April 1, of
2	the current fiscal year, report in detail the plan under which such funds are being expended, and any other
3	information requested by the SALLE Committee. The Department of Safety and Homeland Security shall
4	submit an annual report to the members of the General Assembly, the Director of the Office of Management
5	and Budget, and the Controller General on or before May 1 of the current fiscal year, detailing the agencies
6	that were awarded grants from these funds, the amount of the grants, and the purpose of the grants.
7	Section 16. Appropriations made in Section 1 of this Act to Emergency Medical Services, SALLE,
8	and EIDE shall not be subject to the provisions in Sections 5, 6, 8, and 9. Funds appropriated to SALLE and
9	EIDE shall not be subject to reversion at the end of the fiscal year if unexpended or unencumbered, and shall
10	be continued for a period of up to three years.
11	Section 17. (a) The State Treasurer is authorized to take the necessary steps to make a total payment
12	of the appropriation in Section 2 of this Act at the beginning of the first quarter of the fiscal year for the
13	agencies as follows:

26	(c) The State Treasurer is authorized to take the necessary steps to make a total payment of the
27	appropriation to the fire companies listed in Section 3 of this Act at the beginning of the first quarter of each
28	fiscal year.

- (d) The State Treasurer is authorized to take the necessary steps to make a total payment of the
 appropriation to organizations funded on a one-time basis in Section 2 of this Act at the beginning of the first
 quarter of each fiscal year.
 - 4 Section 18. Section 2 of this Act makes an appropriation to the Delaware State Fair. Of that amount, 5 \$5,000 shall be used for purses on Governor's Day and shall be paid by the State Treasurer at the beginning of 6 the first quarter of each fiscal year. The remainder of the appropriation shall be paid in quarterly allotments, as 7 provided in § 6505 of Title 29 of the Delaware Code, and used for prizes for achievements in agriculture, 8 animal raising, and in works of manual training and the domestic arts to be awarded at the annual State Fair. 9 Section 19. Section 2 of this Act provides a one-time appropriation of \$6,400,000\$3,200,000 for 10 Statewide Fire Companies and Public Service Ambulance Companies. Of this amount, \$100,000\$50,000 shall 11 be provided to each of the fire companies listed in Section3(a) of this Act, \$100,000\$50,000 shall be provided 12 to the Wilmington Fire Department, and \$100,000\$50,000 shall be provided to each of the public service 13 ambulance companies listed in Section 3(j) of this Act. The State Treasurer is authorized to take the necessary 14 steps to make a total one-time payment of this appropriation to the aforementioned organizations at the 15 beginning of the first quarter of Fiscal Year 2023the fiscal year. Section 20. Section 2 of this Act provides a one-time appropriation of \$300,000 to Legislative, 16 17 Legislative Council, Office of the Controller General (01-08-02) to reimburse New Castle, Kent, or Sussex 18 counties on a pro-rata basis for the expense of hiring a consultant(s) to conduct the State of Delaware Fire 19 Service Sustainability Study. 20 Section 21. Notwithstanding the provisions of 9 Del. C. § 2661 or any other state law to the contrary, 21 the Colonial School District shall be permitted to use voluntary school assessment proceeds for projects at the 22 Operations Center to upgrade electrical service for the installation of charging stations as well as complete 23 renovations to both the bus yard and building to improve efficiency and safety as well as increase capacity for 24 bus parking. Colonial School District must follow approval processes in place for the use of these funds. 25 Section 22. Notwithstanding any law, rule, or legislation to the contrary, funding to support Senate 26 Substitute 1 for Senate Bill 1, as amended, of the 152nd General Assembly, is considered a passthrough to the 27 Delaware Volunteer Legal Services, who will administer so that Delaware Volunteer Legal Services,
 - 28 Community Legal Aid Society, Inc., and Legal Services Corporation of Delaware (collectively "Legal Aid

1	Agencies") receive funding in connection with their respective contributions to providing support for Right to		
2	Representation. In light of the passthrough of the funds for this program, the Attorney General does not need to
