

## 152nd GENERAL ASSEMBLY FISCAL NOTE

BILL: HOUSE BILL NO. 287

SPONSOR: Representative Dukes

DESCRIPTION: AN ACT TO AMEND TITLE 16 OF THE DELAWARE CODE RELATING TO RETIRED

LAW-ENFORCEMENT CANINES.

## **Assumptions:**

1. This Act becomes effective upon signature by the Governor.

- 2. This Act allows for an owner of a law-enforcement canine retired from a police department of a political subdivision of the State of Delaware to be reimbursed up to \$1,500 annually for veterinary care expenses paid by the owner for the care of the canine upon submission of documentation of allowable expenses for the retired law-enforcement canine from the Department of Safety and Homeland Security (DSHS).
- 3. Currently, an estimated 100 canines with varying years of active-duty service are among at least 21 of the State's local Law Enforcement Agencies (LEAs). A canine's average active-duty service years can range between six to seven years, with the average life span being between 10 and 12 years old.
- 4. It is estimated that based on the potential for retirement, current ages, and years of service of canines, local LEAs retire an average of about 20 law-enforcement canines annually, with an additional three to four canines retired early annually due to unusual events such as injuries related to active-duty service, health issues, etc.
- 5. Therefore, it is anticipated that the DSHS may issue 24 \$1,500 reimbursements annually.
